### High School Notes

The Tennis team beat New Trier on Saturday morning at the high school. The team played two single and one double game, and lost one single. The tennis team is composed of Ralph Hunt, Percy Oke and Leslie Grant. On Saturday morning the team will go to Evanston to play Evanston High School.

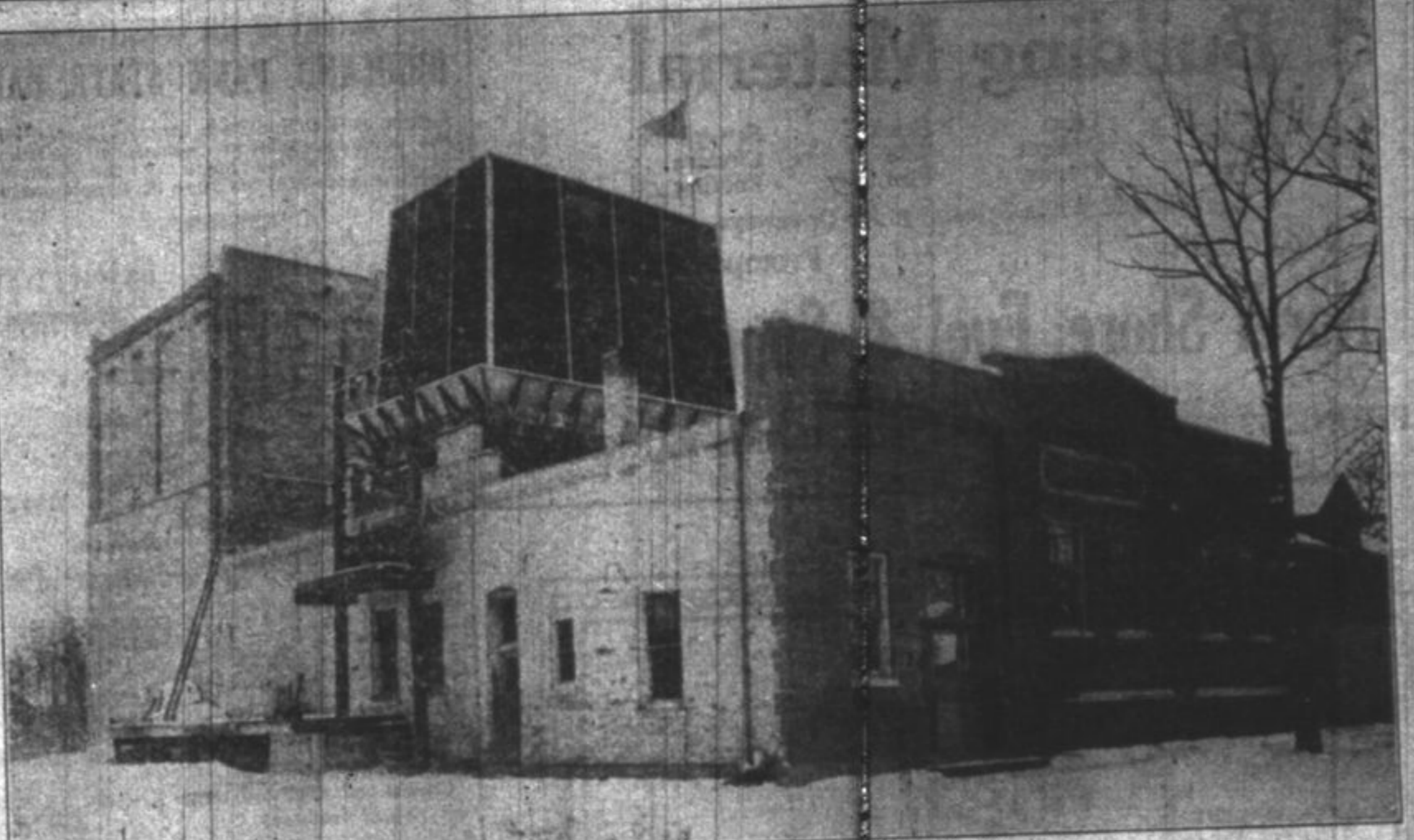
A baseball game with La Grange High School is scheduled for Saturday afternoon on the home grounds. This will be the first Suburban League game to be played at home. The game at Morton last week was a victory for Morton, the score being 5 to 3.

The following extracts from a letter received by Major H. S. Vail from President Woodrow Wilson shows that a good deal of interest is being shown in the cadet corps movement. "This (military training in high schools) is a most important question, and the plan if adopted could not but have beneficial and far reaching results. . . . The military training for the older boys should include practical work in camp and field exercises." The letter is signed Woodrow Wilson.

Principal R. L. Sandwick made the following report at the last meeting of the Board of Education: 448 pupils had been registered in day school, 267 in the night school, 265 in the gymnasium (evening) classes and 176 in the gymnasium classes on Saturday morning. Eleven hundred and fifty-six people have thus made use of the high school equipment.

The increase of interest in school work since the erection of the new buildings was shown in the following report made by Mr. Sandwick on the same occasion. In 1914, 45 per cent of girls taking domestic science voted it their favorite study, and at the present time, after the erection of the industrial arts building, 70 per cent now taking the same work voted it their favorite study, and similarly 50 per cent of the boys in manual training voted it their favorite study in 1914, and 63 per cent. vote it their favorite study now.

Other topics discussed were, the new system of bookkeeping, introduced by Mr. William Raey, the auditor of the board, the improvements in the Commercial Department, the Students' Co-operative Book Store, the new lunch room, the students' self-governing body, the cadet corps, the students' manufacturing company, and the unifying of the grade courses. This year's work has been the most successful the school has ever had.
