Following the fair informal dancing took place in the boys' gymnasium. The proceeds of the entertainment are to go to defray traveling expenses of those who attend the typewriting and shorthand contest at Normal, Ill.

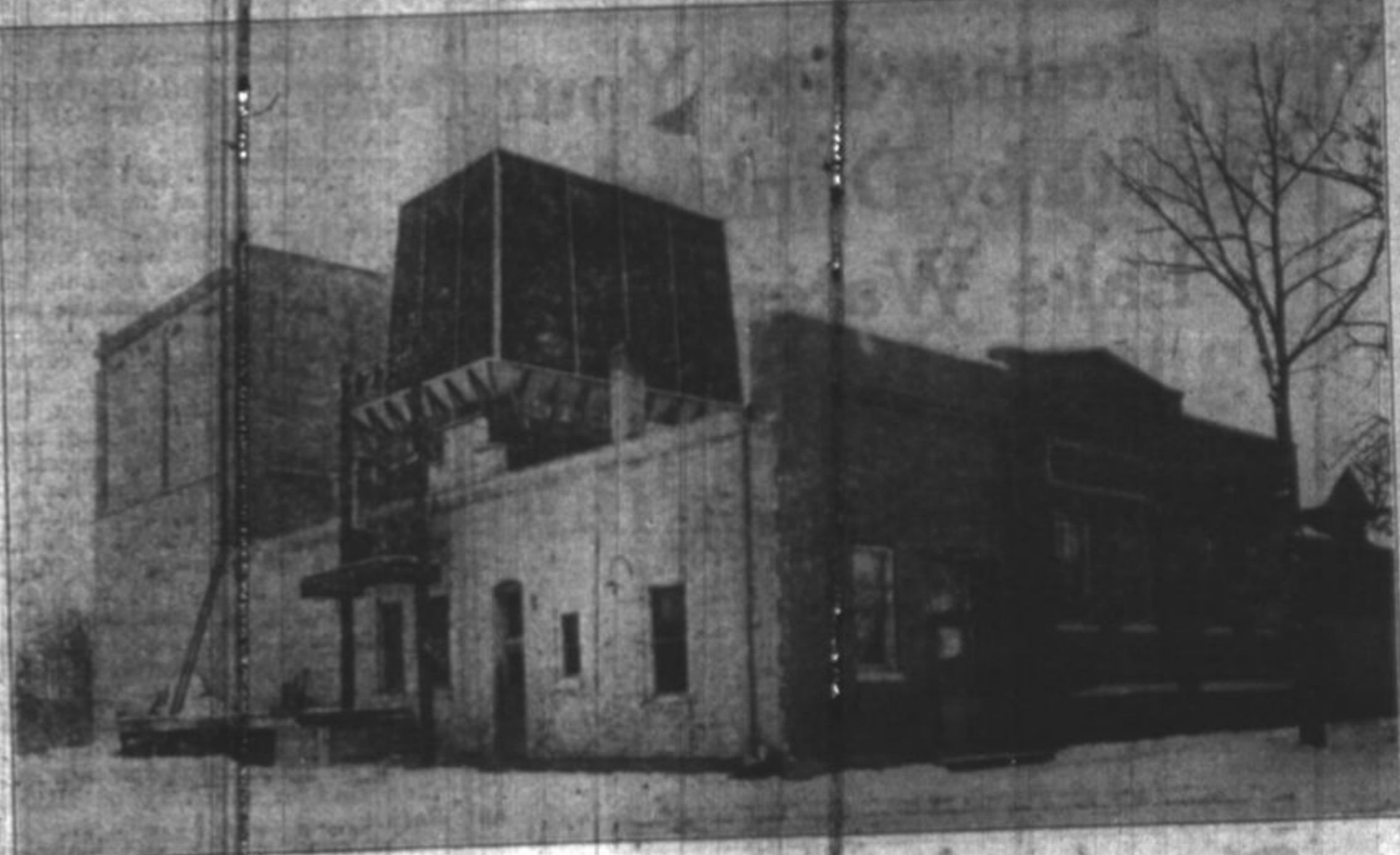
The high school baseball team played New Trier on Tuesday and were victorious, the score being 2 to 4.

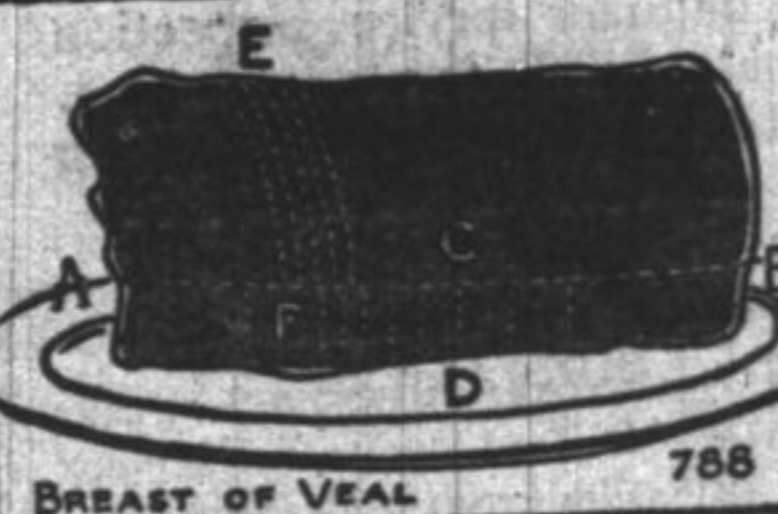
