Miss Elizabeth Dufay of Chicago will be the guest of Miss Eva Lundgren over the week-end.

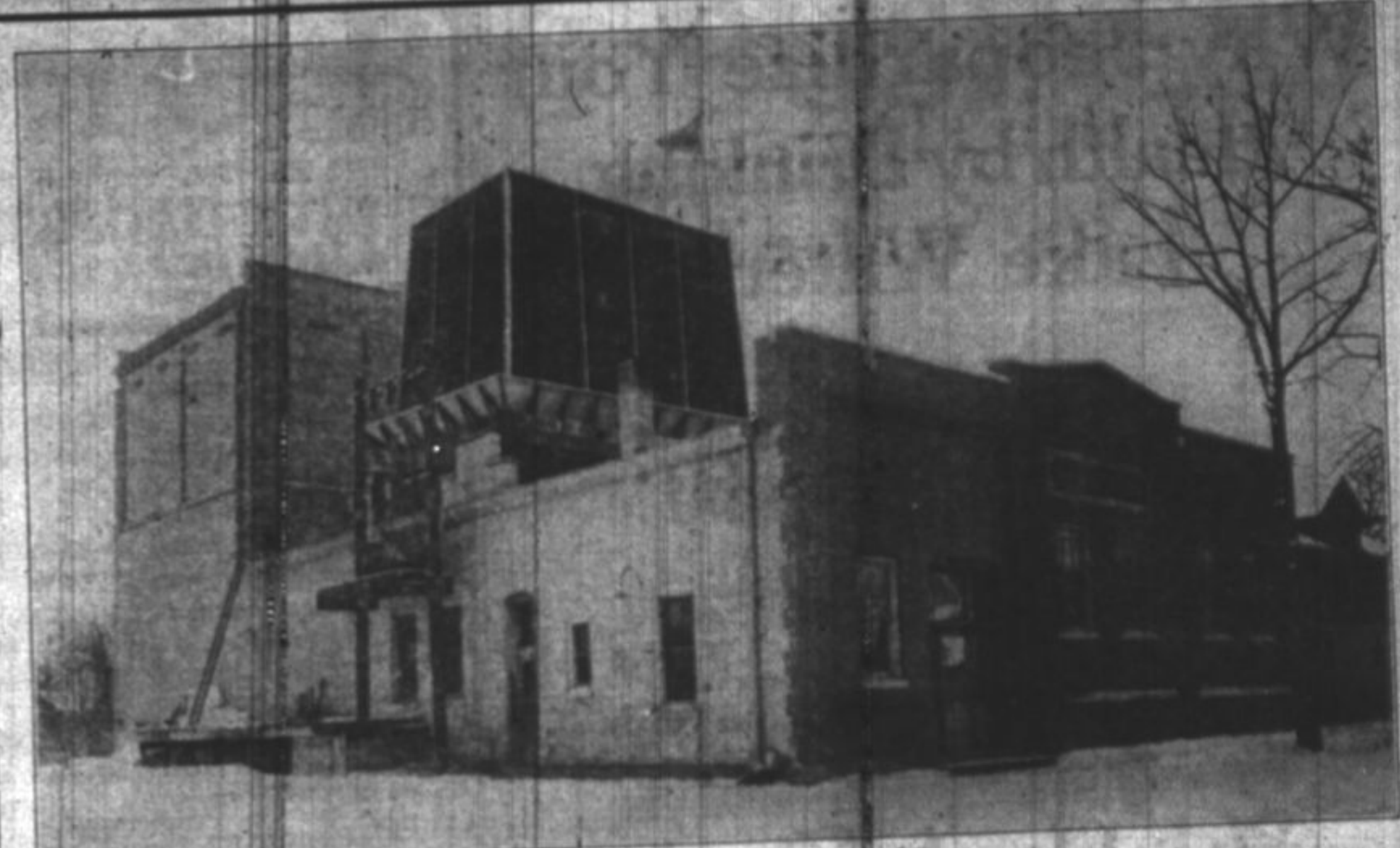
Miss Ellen Anderson of Dale Ave. will return to her home in Joliet to spend several days with her parents.

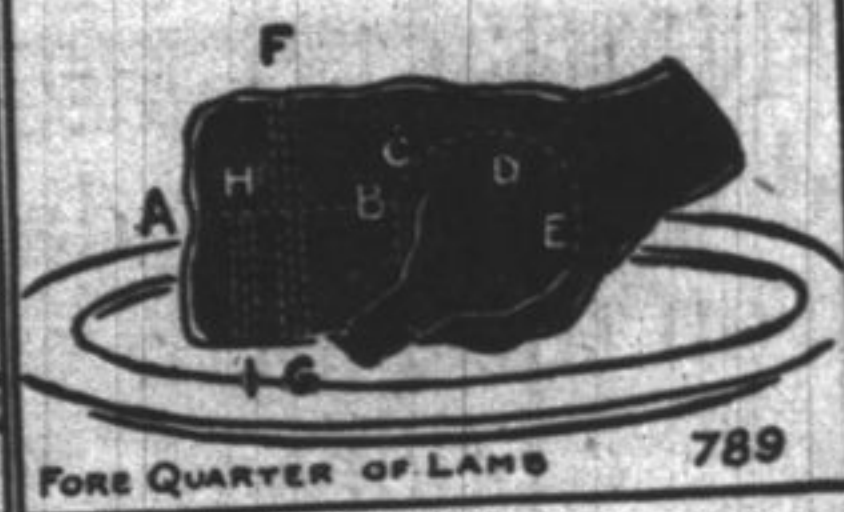

A FOREQUARTER OF LAMB can be served by separating the shoulder part from the breast and ribs. This is done by passing the knife under and dividing the ribs C D E. Cut through the skin, then raise with a little force, the shoulder into which the fork should be firmly set. Divide the ribs from the brisket by cutting from A to B. Carve the ribs from F to G and the brisket by cutting from H to I.

A number of women gathered at the Highland Park club house on Monday to hear a talk on Suffrage and the Suffrage Parade to be held on June 7th in Chicago. Mrs. Medill McCormick, who was to have addressed the meeting was unable to come, and Mrs. James W. Morrison, who is president of the Chicago Equal Suffrage Association, spoke in her place.

In a most interesting talk which was listened to attentively, Mrs. Morrison told of the origin and work of the Association of which she is president. She told also of the origin of the suffrage movement, of how the different states came to have suffrage and of the opposition to the movement. Mrs. McCormick's work was outlined and the good which she has accomplished is most far-reaching. The Susan B. Anthony Amendment to the National Constitution, which is still being earnestly worked on by all the women interested in the movement, was spoken of and explained.

Mrs. Morrison was very enthusiastic over the Suffrage Parade to be held in Chicago June 7th, and urged every woman to march on that day. The idea of marching is to urge the insertion of an equal suffrage plank in the platform to be adopted by the National Republican Convention, which will hold session in Chicago this June.

Mrs. Murray Nelson of Winnetka also spoke of the work being done there for the parade, in which many thousand women have promised to march. Mrs. B. D. Butler has been chosen to act as parade chairman.

The new social committee of the Ossoli Club served refreshments after the meeting. Mrs. W. R. Ruffner is chairman and Mrs. R. K. Buckman, Jr., is co-chairman of the committee.
