Presbyterian Church Notes

At the Presbyterian Church, the Rev. George K. Newell, one of the leaders in the Presbytery of Chicago and a man widely and favorably known in the denomination, will occupy the pulpit Sunday morning, May 28th, in the absence of Dr. Dobson at the General Assembly of the church now being held in Atlantic City.

Mr. Newell was formerly pastor of the St. Cloud Presbyterian Church at West Orange, N. J., and was called from there to the Sixth Presbyterian Church of Chicago where he succeeded the Rev. Dr. Merrill.

Mr. Newell is well known and pleasantly remembered by many Highland Park people. He will speak on the general subject of "The Burden of the City," a title suggestive of the most interesting problems of the Church and State in our country at this time and a title that promises a further interesting word along the lines of the stirring but non-partisan and dignified plea of Rev. Pasquale De Carlo in the pulpit of the church last Sunday, urging a more energetic and devoted Christian citizenship as the basis of true "Preparedness" and as a guard against the evils of militarism on the one hand and blind ignorance or selfish inattention to existing evils and to the dangers threatening our people, on the other.

The General Assembly deals with church policy, missions, benevolences, doctrine and all important or disturbing questions throughout the church organization.
