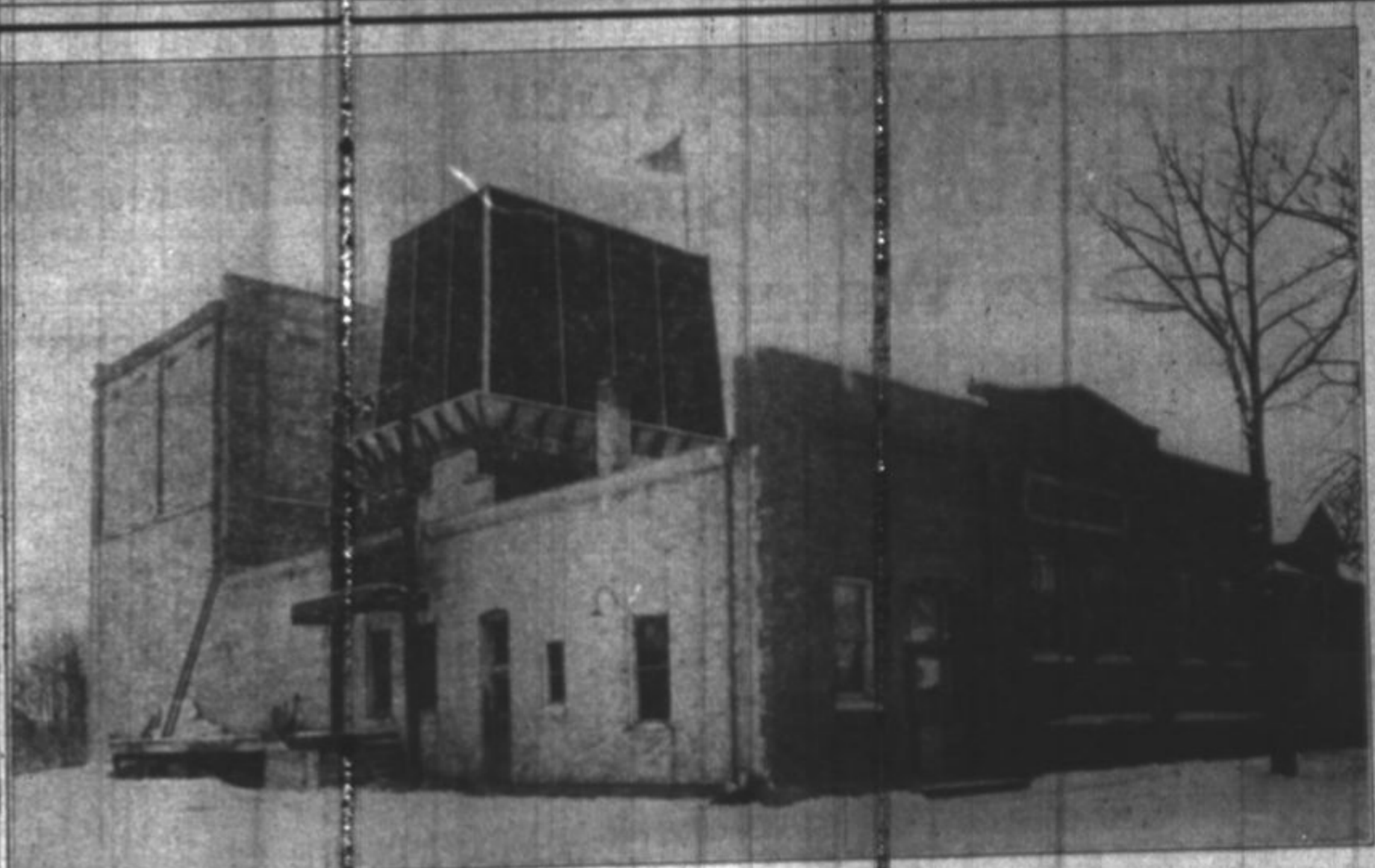
NEW MORNING MAIL TRAIN

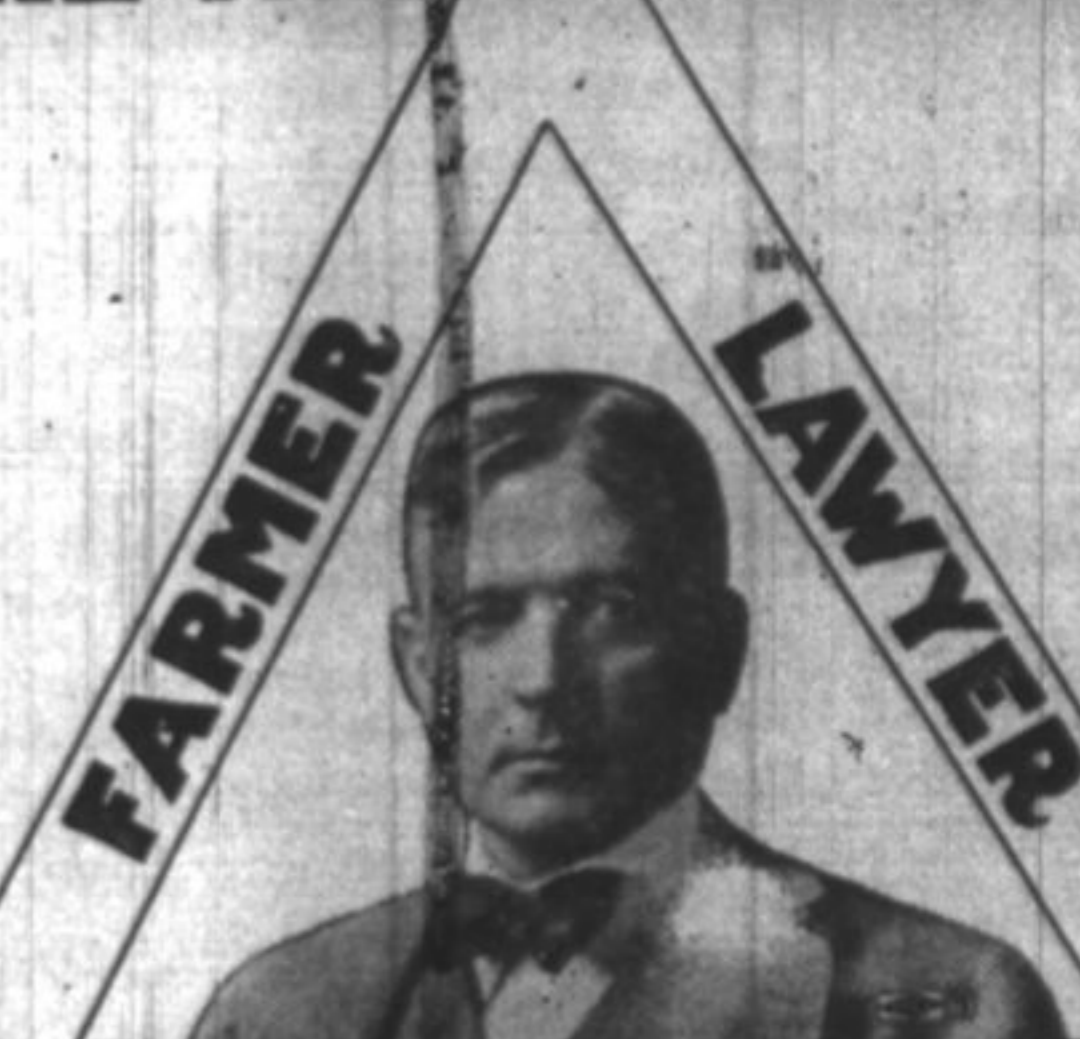
