Specifications for publication in official newspaper for the city of Highland Park, Ill.

1. Specifications for all contracts of whatever character pertaining to public improvement or the maintenance of public property of the City of Highland Park, involving an outlay of as much as five hundred dollars (\$500.00) to be published as provided by law.

2. All notices, ordinances, advertisements, reports, proceedings and miscellaneous matters required to be published by the terms of an Act relating to the Commission Form of Municipal Government entitled "An Act to amend an act" entitled "An Act to provide for the incorporation of cities and villages," approved April 10th, 1872, in force July 1st, 1872, and all Acts amendatory thereto by adding thereto Article XIII. As amended by Acts approved April 17th (1911, and May 12th, 1911.

3. There being no secular English daily newspaper, the above work shall be published in some secular English weekly newspaper published in said City of Highland Park. The terms

of this contract shall be for the fiscal year ending April 30th, 1917.

SPECIAL ASSESSMENT NOTICE

NO. 67

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN to all persons interested that the City Council of the City of Highland Park, County of Lake and State of Illinois, have ordered that Prairie Avenue from the West City Limits East to its intersection with the West line of the paved roadway on High Street and Prairie Avenue from its intersection with the East line of the paved roadway on High Street, East to its junction with the paved roadway herein provided for on Railway Avenue; Railway Avenue from its intersection with the East City Limits, northerly to its intersection with the South line of the paved roadway on Highland Avenue be graded, drained and paved with an eighteen (18) foot Portland Cement Concrete pavement with five (5) inch curb edges and otherwise improved. The ordinance for same being on file in the office of the City Clerk of said City and having applied to the County Court for an assessment for the cost of said improvement according to benefits, and an assessment roll having been made and returned to said Court, the

final hearing thereon will be held on the nineteenth day of June, A. D. 1916, or as soon thereafter as the business of the Court will permit.

Said assessment is payable in ten (10) installments with interest at the rate of five (5) per centum on all installments from and after date of issue of first voucher. All persons desiring may file objections in said Court before said day, and may appear on the hearing and make their defense.
