**SECOND INTERNATIONAL AUTO DERBY**

To be Held at Speedway Park, Maywood on Saturday, June 10th

A record advance sale of more than 30,000 reservations for the Second International Auto Derby to be run at Speedway Park on June 10 has been announced by the officials of the speedway, who now expect forty starters when the entry lists close.

Coming as it does during the week of the Republican and Progressive National conventions the demand for seats from out of town have been ten times what would be the ordinary run of things. This does not mean, however, that there is any shortage of seats for the huge grand stands hold close to 150,000, but it is an indication that the local race will break all previous records so far as attendance is concerned. Last year 80,000 viewed the battle for first place with only an advance sale two weeks before the race of 5,000 tickets.

There will undoubtedly be two Hudson cars in the race. Vail has already entered the one in which he scored at New York and Ralph Mitchell has sent word that he has a new Super Six at Indianapolis that he will enter in the Chicago race along with his Peugeot. He will probably handle the Hudson himself and it would not surprise the local followers of the speed game if Joe Dawson returned to the game at the wheel of the Peugeot.

iting pitcher and when the dust had cleared eight runs were over the plate and the game was won, although the Troutlers fought desperately to overcome this lead, but were unable to do so. Our team looks very strong but that signifies class which is the chief aim of the management. They must be strong in order to compete with such teams as Evanston, Waukegan, Kenosha and Racine, from which they expect to win the championship of the North Shore and Lake County before the season expires.

Decoration Day, Evanston certainly put up an awful strong battle, as when the ninth opened up, Highland Park was leading by only one run, the score being 5 to 4 in favor of our boys, but heavy hitting by Leyden, Fiene and Williams netted two more runs, totalling seven. Little Jimmie Leyden was a sensation on the bases, pulling some Ty Cobb stunts, scoring from second on an infield out in the third inning and in the ninth scored from first when Fiene singled to left. This is something unusual, and seldom seen outside the big leagues, but again we must mention that this is the management's aim to get the best material that can be acquired, quality being their main asset. The first inning opened with Cronin getting a life on a hard hit ball and then Leyden drew a base on balls. Collins attempted to sacrifice and hit a short fly between the pitcher's box and home plate and Cronin thinking it would be caught played safe, but the ball fell safe and Cronin was then forced at third. Fiene singled sharply to left and the runners were held to one base. Williams hit to the pitcher and Leyden was forced at home, then Hauser hit to third and was out at first. Evanston got one man to first but the next three went out in order. In the second Cross drew a base on balls and Reed singled to left, Cross halting at second. Mitchell tried to sacrifice but made a perfect bunt and was safe at first. Cronin hit one at Driscoll that was travelling a mile a minute and Cross was thrown out at home. This picture shows an example—three porcelain wall sockets on the inside edge of the table, connected with the house circuit through a flush receptacle fixed in the center of the floor. In this case, the cord is brought up through the middle leg of the table. If the latter doesn't happen to be provided with that support there are other ways of leading the cord up and concealing it. Of course it and the floor plug are detachable so the table can be moved at will. One or all three of the sockets can be used at once.
