SPECIAL ASSESSMENT NOTICE

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN to all persons interested that the City Council of the City of Highwood, County of Lake and State of Illinois, have ordered that Prairie Avenue from the West City Limits East to its intersection with the West line of the paved roadway on High Street and Prairie Avenue from its intersection with the East line of the paved roadway on High Street, East to its junction with the paved roadway herein provided for on Railway Avenue; Railway Avenue from its intersection with the East City Limits, Northerly to its intersection with the South line of the paved roadway on Highwood Avenue be graded, drained and paved with an eighteen (18) foot Portland Cement Concrete pavement with five (5) inch curb edges and otherwise improved. The ordinance for same being on file in the office of the City Clerk of said City and having applied to the County Court for an assessment for the cost of said improvement according to benefits, and an assessment roll having been made and returned to said Court, the
