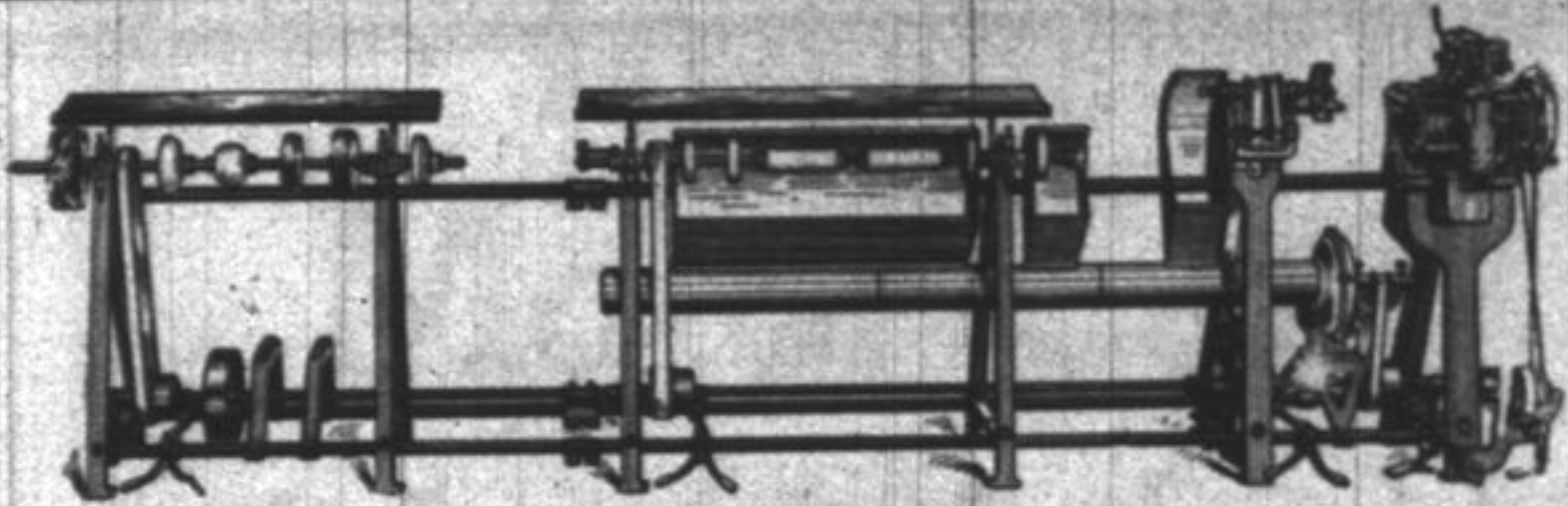

ROY STOKER A REAL HERO

Saves Drowning Man in Pacific Ocean When Sail Boat Capsizes

The friends and acquaintances of Roy Stoker, formerly of this city, will be pleased to hear of a heroic act in saving a man's life in the Pacific Ocean two miles from shore. Roy, who is chief engineer on the U. S. S. South Dakota, while out in a steam launch off the coast of Seattle discovered two men in a small sail boat which had capsized. Neither of the men were able to swim. One was about to drown while the other clung to the side of the capsized boat. Mr. Stoker who is a powerful man and an expert swimmer, jumped into the water and swam to shore with the unconscious man and thereby saved his life.

Ebenezer Evangelical Church

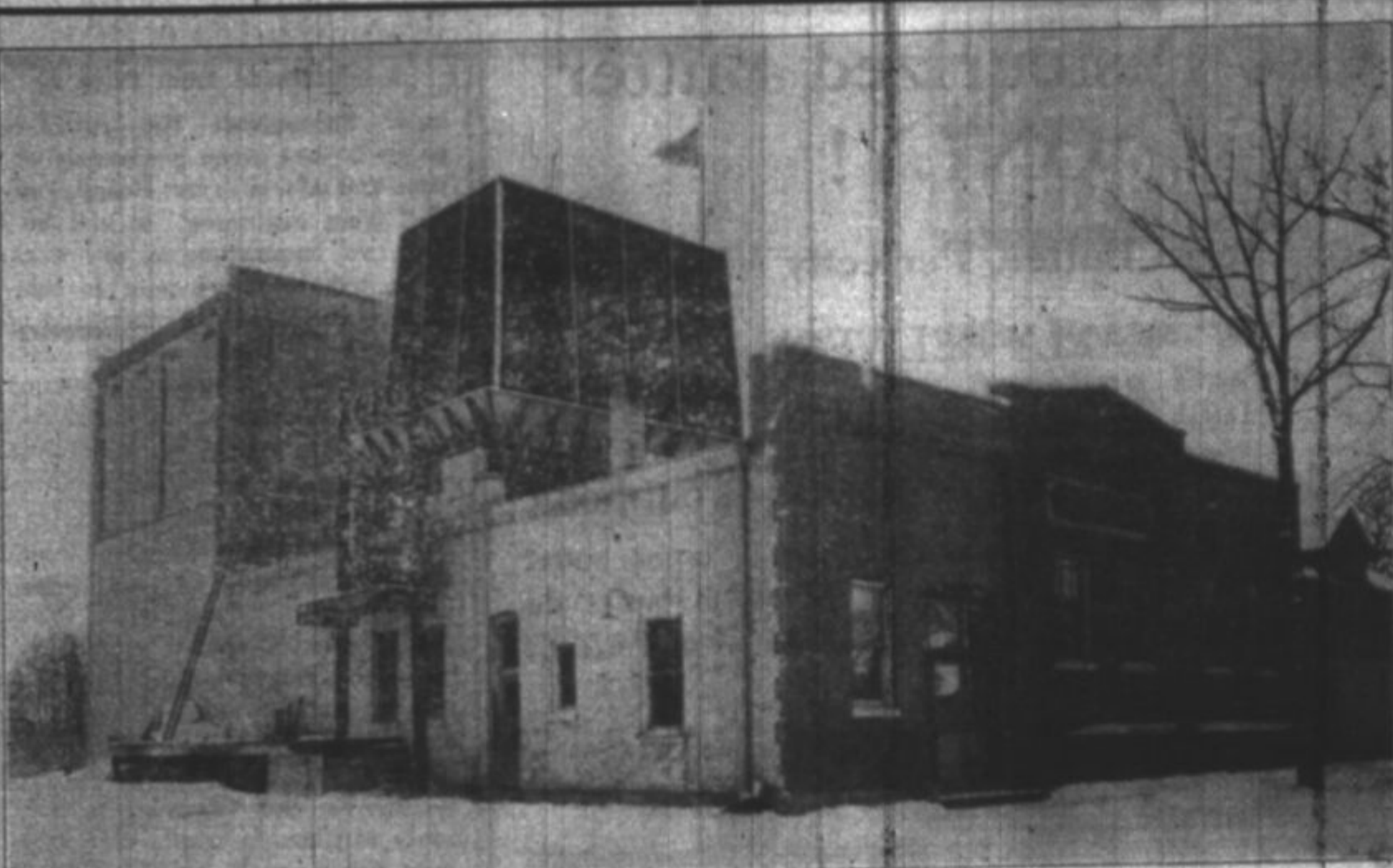

MAMIE PORTER ADJUDGED INSANE

Chief of Police Meyers Accompanies Patient to Elgin Institution

Miss Mamie Porter, a local telephone operator, went insane suddenly two weeks ago and was tried for her sanity in county court Monday afternoon at 1 o'clock. The jury after hearing the evidence in the case returned a verdict that the patient is insane and she was ordered committed to the hospital for the insane at Elgin.

In the statements in the interrogatories which came out at the trial, two possible reasons are given for the breaking down of the young woman's mind. They are:

First—Overwork while employed as a telephone operator.

Second—The extraction of several teeth two weeks ago.

It was shown that Miss Porter had worked hard and had worried much. It was also shown that she had several teeth extracted two weeks ago and had at once gone to bed. Her aberration seemed to date from that time. She became very destructive of furniture and dishes; she was noisy both day and night and at times became so violent that her family had to forcibly restrain her. Finally it was decided that the only thing which might help her would be a course of treatment in the hospital for the insane. Chief of Police Meyers accompanied her to the Elgin institution Monday afternoon. It is believed that she will recover after a short treatment.
