ings. Throughout the entire campaign he has given generously of his time and efforts in the Hospital cause, and from beginning to end he has been an inspiration to the workers. High tributes were paid to him by Father O'Neill, Dr. Dobson and other speakers at Monday night's meeting, but perhaps the highest tribute of all is the one that is paid silently in the high esteem and genuine affection in which the people of Highland Park hold the Mayor of their city.

The triumph of Monday night's meeting was, therefore, not entirely unexpected. It was known that the public was interested and that aid would be forthcoming when it was needed, but the instant response at the Mayor's suggestion that 69 people in addition to the 31 he had personally secured on the morning's train en route to Chicago, would pledge \$50 a year for three years for the maintenance of the Hospital, was most gratifying. "I expected," said Mayor Hastings, "to have to coax and persuade and almost beg for this money but you are giving it to me so quickly and so generously and so gladly that I cannot even keep track of the count and I'll have to turn that part of it over to our treasurer, Mr. Millard." The Mayor's appeal for the annual subscriptions came immediately following Mr. Millard's report of over \$63,000 in cash and subscriptions.

Amid an enthusiastic burst of applause Mayor Hastings called the meeting to order and introduced Rev. E. Tetreau, pastor of the Methodist Church, who gave an inspiring address. Rev. Tetreau was followed by Rev. C. Umbach, the new pastor of the Evangelical Church; Dr. Dobson, Dr. O'Neill, Walter C. Hatley and several others, who spoke briefly and to the point.

On behalf of the Women's Committee of the campaign, Mrs. H. B. Roberts, whose splendid work as general chairman of the women's committee has kept her in constant touch with the several hundred women who have been assisting in the movement, was the recipient of a handsome bouquet of Killarney roses. The presentation was made by Mayor Hastings, who added his personal thanks to Mrs. Roberts and that of the Executive Committee for her untiring devotion to the campaign work.

A resolution of thanks from the Hospital Association presented by Walter H. Baldwin to Miss Coughaine, the director of the campaign, was received with hearty applause. The resolution read as follows:

"Resolved, That the Highland Park Hospital Association extend a vote of thanks to Miss Coughaine for her efficient organization in the past few weeks and for the spirit of good feeling and good fellowship engendered as a result of her effort among so many of our citizens which has resulted in the successful result of this campaign. And it is further resolved that the Mayor of Highland Park is authorized to embody these resolutions in a letter to Miss Coughaine."

Mayor Hastings personally thanked the workers, the captains, the young ladies who were serving the dinners, all persons giving donations large and small, particularly those who gave the great mass of small subscriptions that have made up a large part of this fund, the Executive Committee and the Advisory Board for their fine efforts during this movement. The Highland Park Press for its co-operation in publishing the stories of interest concerning the campaign, The Highland Park News Company for its co-operation in distributing thousands of circulars free of charge, to the McPherson Garage, Moraine Garage, Becker's Garage and Larson's Garage for their courtesy in donating cars for the use of the workers, Dr. Wolcott for the use of Trinity Guild House for meetings, Mr. Sandwick for the use of Deerfield High School, Mr. Wright and the pupils of the Lincoln School for postponing their play from Monday night until Tuesday night in order not to interfere with the campaign meeting, to Mr. Morgan for the moving picture show given in the school for the benefit of the Hospital and to the many other friends who aided in any way in making the campaign a success.

Among the guests at the dinner on Monday night were twenty members of the Knights of Columbus, headed by Arthur Newbold, chairman. Chairman Newbold announced that the Knights had collected a fund of \$300 to name a room at the Hospital. Mr. Wm. M. Dooley, of the committee, made a further announcement that through this committee the room would be furnished and decorated and that a number of ladies had promised to provide the linen for this room.

Mayor Hastings announced that another lady had pledged the linen for one room and a bath room for all time. Mrs. W. A. Alexander added \$100 to her previous subscription of

\$200 for the purpose of naming the W. A. Alexander room. Mayor Hastings announced that one little lad of 2½ years who had saved \$2.50 in pennies in his bank found his way to the Mayor's home a few days ago with the bank and told him to use it for the hospital. Three other young boys 9, 11 and 12 years of age who save their money by milking cows and doing chores around their home each subscribed for one share of Hospital stock from the money that they had personally earned. Little Lena Zwetow called at the campaign office with \$100 of the money that she had saved in her little bank since Christmas and which she said was to be used for a sick baby.

At a recent meeting Mayor Hastings announced the addition of Mr. C. N. Kimball and Mr. Walter H. Baldwin to the site committee.

The complete Executive Committee of Highland Park Hospital includes Mayor S. M. Hastings, Dr. Lloyd M. Bergen, Mrs. J. McGregor Adams, Dr. H. S. Haskin, Mrs. A. R. Carqueville, Mr. C. T. Boynton, Mr. Richmond Dean, Mr. Everett L. Millard, Mr. M. W. Kozminski, Dr. H. B. Roberts, Mr. J. P. Smith, Mrs. E. V. Price, Mr. Herman Densel, Mr. R. S. Kirchberger, Mr. Edw. G. Huber, Mrs. Francis Everett, Miss Mary Dooley, Dr. A. R. Sheldon, Mr. C. N. Kimball, and Mr. Walter H. Baldwin.

Mayor Hastings announced that building material is very high just now but that conditions will be watched carefully, by those in charge of the building of the new Hospital and that just as soon as conditions are favorable the work of the Hospital building will be begun.

He further announced that the elevation which has been shown in the Hospital pictures is only a tentative sketch and that the actual architect's work for the new building will be done by local architects, also that all building material will be purchased from or through local dealers and that the entire work of construction will be in the hands of Highland Park firms.

Highland Park Hospital will be a handsome building. It will be perfectly equipped with all the appliances known to modern science for the relief of suffering. It will be small but it will be perfect in every detail; its private sun wards will be restful and will be properly equipped for the comfort and care of the sick. It will be in charge of an efficient nursing corps. Every physician in Highland Park and vicinity is on its Advisory Committee.

It is suggested to all those who desire to establish memorial for loved ones who have passed on or to memorialize a family name can find no better way of so doing than in this great institution for relief of suffering. The buildings itself can be named by the payment of a sufficiently large sum. Smaller sums will be for the naming of the men's ward, the women's ward, the maternity ward, the isolation wing, the sun parlor, private rooms and various other important departments of the Hospital. As at best there are not more than 25 departments that can be used as memorials it is suggested that anyone having this plan of memorial in mind should at once communicate with Mayor Hastings.

The name of every donor to the campaign fund will be placed in the Book of Memory which will be kept at the Hospital.

Mayor Hastings announced at Monday evening's meeting that in order to retain for all time the interest and support of the women who had aided on the women's committees he had asked for the formation of a women's auxiliary and appointed Mrs. J. McGregor Adams as its president.

The campaign headquarters in the Sherman Block will be kept open for some time for receiving donations and giving out any information that may be required. It is suggested that any one who has not yet given to the fund may call at the campaign headquarters any time this week and be sure that the committee will be more than glad to add their subscription to the permanent fund.
