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## NEW DEERPATH INN, LAKE FOREST



The very latest project, on the North Shore, is the new Deerpath Inn, located at Lake Forest, Ill. M. H. ### CRANDALL CRIME RESULT OF TROUBLE

Waukegan Ball Teams Still on Top. Liquor Cases Attracting Attention of Lake County. Three Admitted to Bar.

### Crandall Crime Result of Trouble

Thirteen months of unhappy married life culminated in Sunday's tragedy at Lake Forest where the dead bodies of Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd A. Crandall of Flint, Mich., and their baby were found.

Demented, angry or despondent, Crandall took his wife and year-old son along the bridge path on the west bank of the Skokie River in Lake Forest Saturday evening, and within gunshot of the Onwentsia club finished a bag of peanuts, waited until the others had fallen asleep, then killed them both and himself.

Investigation shows that the Crandalls had quarreled for months, since they were married, June, 1915, had moved six times, their departure from most of the places being requested by landlords who say they couldn't stand the terrible wrangling of the couple, which disturbed not only other occupants of the houses in which they lived, but those adjoining.

### Waukegan Teams Still Winning

In a game which resembled a three-ring circus the south side Whales slipped an eight to three score over the Pirates Sunday while the west side Giants took a fall out of the Kenoshas by piling up a ten to one victory.

On the west side the Jefferys dropped way below that 9 run average, getting one measly little marker while the heavy artillery of the Giants piled up 10 counters. Every member of the Giants busted at least one hit and when the melee was over the miniature auto registered 12 hits for 19 bases.

## BATTLE SHIP CRUISE FOR ONE MONTH

Five Men From This City Enlist for Atlantic Coast Cruise: Profitable Vacation

There still is opportunity for men in Lake County to enlist for the naval training cruise. The government has extended the time for enlistment to August 1. It is planned to send 200 men from the Chicago district, which includes Lake County.

This is considered a fine opportunity to spend a month's vacation aboard a battleship at practically no cost. The training will be such as will prove valuable not only perhaps to the government in time of war, but to every man taking it.

## MRS. GEORGIANA E. McBEAN DIES

Mother of George B. and Archibald J. F. McBean. Funeral Tuesday. Private Burial.

Georgiana E. McBean, mother of George B. and Archibald J. F. McBean died Saturday morning at her residence, 505 Hazel avenue after an illness of several weeks.

She was the daughter of George Barnet, who came from Scotland to Canada in 1830 and settled in Illinois near Lockport in the early forties and was at the time of his death president of the Joliet and Chicago R. R. now the Chicago and Alton.

Mrs. McBean was born at St. Catharines, Canada, and was one of a family of thirteen children of whom only a brother and sister survive. In 1886 she married Archibald J. McBean, who died in 1908 and had spent nearly all her married life in Chicago. She was one of the oldest members of the Chicago Woman's Club, the Art Institute, the Antiquarians, Archaeological Society and Amateur Musical.

Funeral services were read at the residence Tuesday morning at ten thirty followed by private burial.

## F. S. MUNRO SEEKS STATE LAW POST

STRICT PLATFORM TO DEFEND LAWS

Furges Suit Counsel is Candidate For Republican Nomination. Promises Real Service. Runs Independently

Fayette S. Munro announced early this week that he would run for attorney general in the Republican primaries. He has a platform of four short planks one of which is directed against violators of law at the state-house.

Mr. Munro is the attorney who conducted the Ferguson suite by which many legislative appropriations were knocked on the head by the Supreme Court and the legislature had to hold two special sessions to straighten out the tangle in which it had involved itself. As a candidate Mr. Munro says that, if elected, he will prosecute all classes of lawbreakers, from legislators who pad the pay, rolls down to clerks who issue false vouchers.

The Munro platform reads as follows:

### IF ELECTED

I will conduct my office as a lawyer representing the people and not a party or faction of a party.

I will prosecute and convict any man who violates the law. This will include the clerk who issues a false voucher and the legislator who pads the pay roll. It does not exclude the highest officer in the state. A certificate of election does not suspend the criminal code or grant immunity.

I will appoint in my office the best legal talent obtainable. This means real lawyers and not politicians.

I do not belong to and will not join any organization which will hamper me in doing my full duty to the state.

Mr. Munro's supporters declare his campaign will be independent and will be made regardless of factional slates. Some of the Progressives have been considering getting an endorsement for him on the Deenee-West-Hull-Progressives state slate.

Mr. Munro is a resident of Highland Park, and has a great many friends here, who wish him success.

## NEW POLICE HEADQUARTERS

Number 114 E. Central Ave. is Fitted Up for Local Police. Office of Chief of Police

The police headquarters have been moved from the fire station to 114 East Central Ave. The telephone, which was formerly located at the Erskine corner and which has always been an annoyance to the officers on account of passing trains, has been installed in the new office, together with the chief's desk and filing cabinets for all police records. Mr. William Stone, chauffeur at the Mandel home in Ravinia, is a son-in-law of the deceased. Relatives and friends took the body to Lafayette, Ind., for burial, Monday.
