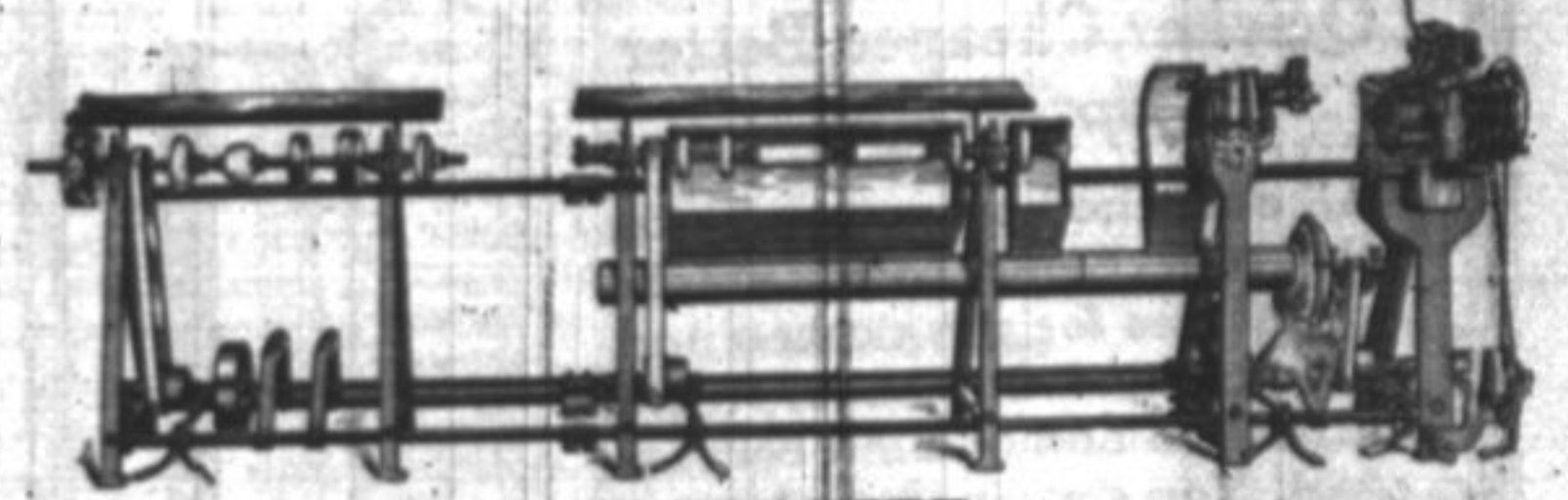

Drowned in Waukegan Harbor
William D. Kellar, ships cook, second class, U. S. Navy, drowned in Waukegan harbor within sight of over 600 bathers and 1,000 spectators at 5 o'clock Sunday afternoon when he was seized with a cramp while attempting to swim across the harbor. His body was not recovered Sunday, despite the fact that the executive officer at the Great Lakes station sent two searching squads to Waukegan Sunday afternoon. The search was kept up until 9 p. m. The search was resumed Monday morning, the body being recovered shortly before noon.
