SEALED BIDS will be received for the construction of a Portland Cement Concrete Sidewalk four feet (4") in width and five inches (5") in thickness on Deerfield Avenue, Woodward Avenue and Hazel Avenue (except in front of certain property), by the Board of Local Improvements of the Village of Deerfield, Illinois, on the 28th day of August, 1916, at the hour of 8 o'clock P. M., at the Village Hall, in the said Village of Deerfield, Illinois, at which time and place said bids will be publicly opened.

Proposals must be made on blanks furnished by said Board and in compliance with the instructions thereto attached, which can be had on application to the Village Clerk, and must be accompanied by cash or by a check payable to order of the President of said Board of Local Improvements, certified by a responsible bank, for an amount not less than 10 per cent of the total amount of the bid.

The Contractor shall be paid in cash and bonds—five installments—five (5%) per cent.

No bids will be received unless the party offering it shall furnish evidence satisfactory to said Board of Local Improvements that he has the necessary facilities, ability and pecuniary resources to fulfill the conditions of the contract and execute the work should the contract be awarded him.

Bidders will examine the ordinance, maps, plats, plans, profiles and specifications, and also the locality in which said work is to be done, and judge for themselves of all the circumstances and surrounding conditions affecting the cost and nature of the work.

Bids will also be taken on approximately 500 feet of sidewalk to be constructed under Direct Taxation on Osterman Avenue.
