PENALTY OF A RIME.

Gaestic Collingborne Paid For His Taunt at Richard III.

Did you ever hear of a spring poet who came to his death because of a rime? Doubtless many spring poets have merited the same fate, but in our day justice tarries and the world suffers in silence.

It was not thus when Richard III, last of the Plantagenets, ruled England. In the main the people who did not agree with the Duke of Gloucester were wise enough to keep their opinions to themselves, but William Collingborne thought to stretch poetic license to make it cover an attack on his majesty at a time when the murder of the two princes in the Tower ought to have taught prudence.

The king was under the sway of a beautiful and clever woman, Mrs. Lovell, who was thought to dictate much of his policy, which was hopelessly bad. Now, Collingborne had recourse to the fact that the wolf dog was called a "lovel," and so he penned the famous rime, "The rat, the cat and lovel, our dog, rule all England under the hog." As a result, England was decidedly "on the hog."

Did the rime escape the eagle eye of Gloucester? Well, if it did it was not overlooked by the lady. That was a year before the famous battle of Bosworth, when the Earl of Richmond came to the rescue of his suffering people. Richard had put down Buckingham's rebellion, and all the traitors had paid the price with their heads, so another head more or less did not matter. Collingborne was summoned into court, given a perfunctory trial and sent to the block. However, there is no evidence that he was punished for writing atrocious poetry. —St. Louis Globe-Democrat

Woodbury the Composer. Among obscure composers of hymn tunes that have lasted long is Isaac Baker Woodbury of Beverly, Mass., who began his career as a blacksmith's apprentice. He finally studied in Europe and was an associate of the better known musicians of the day. His tune called "Siloam," sung to Hober's "By Cool Siloam's Shady Hill," is known to most churchgoers.

REPUBLICANISM IS PROVINE'S KEYNOTE

Candidate for Attorney General Believes in Republican Party's Ability to Solve Problems.

His faith in the Republican party is founded upon his belief in efficient service. Walter M. Provine of Taylorville, candidate for the Republican nomination for Attorney General, declared today.

Public officials must use the power of their office vigorously to defend and contend for the preservation and enforcement of wise laws."

"The office of Attorney General is one of the most important in the gift of the people of the State of Illinois. I would manage and conduct it in accordance with the constitution, statutes and decisions of the courts for the best interests of the people of the state if elected."

Mr. Provine has served five terms in the legislature. He was the Republican caucus nominee for speaker at the last session, but was defeated because he refused to enter into a bi-partisan combine.

- \$13,774.43 paid into the county treasury as back taxes from the estate of Nathaniel C. Seare and other estates, which such decedents had avoided paying during their life time.
- \$14,975.34 paid into state treasury as back taxes from same estates.

If re-elected to the office of State's Attorney my policy in the future will be, as it has been in the past, to enforce the laws as I find them.
