"A number of bills are pending," continued Mr. Rainey, "creating a one cent son, aged 27. rate on local delivery sealed letters. It is impossible to grant this rate, equitable as it is, without readjusting the entire service so as to make great magazines and papers of national character pay what they ought to pay. Under the proposed zone rates not more than one cent per pound is likely to be fixed for the first zone of 300 miles and at the same time the free-in-county circulation given now to local newspapers will not be affected in the least. Very few small local papers have a circulation which extends more than two hundred miles from the place of publication. Small county newspapers should still enjoy the privileges they now enjoy. The advertising matter is carried principally for local merchants at exceedingly low rates. Hundreds of dollars and sometimes thousands of dollars are obtained for a single page in the large magazines of the country.
