LINDBLOOM NOT GUILTY

Police Magistrate Taylor of Waukegan Refuses to Hold Defendant Over to Grand Jury

For the second time since the 25th of June, Olof Lindbloom, has been found not guilty of attempting to rescue a prisoner from a Highland Park policeman. It was Police Magistrate Taylor of Waukegan who liberated Lindbloom from custody the second time.

Officer Howe charged that Mr. Lindbloom attempted to rescue Nick Peterson from him following his arrest on the 25th of June.

Several witnesses were put on the stand and these men testified that Howe, without provocation, had clubbed Peterson over the head with a billy; had fallen on him and had choked him severely.

Howe claims that he beat Peterson into submission after Peterson had wrestled his club from him, and after Peterson had clubbed him over the head and face.

He claims that Lindbloom attempted to rescue Peterson from him after he had beaten Peterson into submission.

"I pleaded with Howe not to use his club on the man after he gave up. I doubt whether Peterson ever struck Howe, and I certainly do not believe that the officer conducted himself in a humane and gentlemanly manner," said Lindbloom.

The trial was held in the Waukegan gas police station and lasted nearly four hours.
