WORK FOR FRENCH WOUNDED ADVANCE

Complete Report of Summer's Work Done at Trinity Parish House

During the summer, the work for the French wounded, has been carried on by a faithful group, at the Trinity Parish House.

The amount accomplished is as follows: rolled bandages, 339; knee bandages, 14; eye bandages, 40; bed pads, 53; sponges, 283 packages, 10 to a package; 1 metre 150, packages, 3 to a package, pajamas, 8; knitted mats, 25; knitted sponges, 6; slippers 40 pairs; 41 small pillows; 4 bundles scraps; 63 glass covers; 31 tray covers. There was a contribution of 720 pairs of socks, \$10 worth of bulk cotton and \$10 for slippers was also given. These latter were sent direct to Paris from the shop at 60 E. Washington St., Chicago, where all supplies may be brought at any time. Each week the articles finished in Highland Park, are taken to this shop and from there are taken as quickly as possible to wherever they are most needed in France.

Women all over the United States are helping in this great work and the gratitude of the French soldiers and the nation in general is warmly expressed in the letters which come to the shop.

All day meetings are to be held on Wednesdays at the Parish House all winter, beginning Wednesday, October fourth. All who are interested in helping the French wounded are cordially invited to come. Please bring your lunch, coffee is served. The more workers the better. There is plenty of work which is easy to do. If anyone prefers to work at home, the material and directions may be obtained by telephoning Mrs. Everett Millard.

There is to be a program on the first of the All-Day Meetings, Wednesday, October fourth. Miss Elizabeth Perkins, who has been abroad actively engaged in war relief work, and who has been addressing numbers of people in New England, will speak to the workers. Miss Draper will give a number of monologues. There is to be no charge for this, and it is hoped that everyone possible will avail themselves of the opportunity of hearing these interesting people.
