Presbyterian Church Notes

Much interest is being taken in the Presbyterian Bazaar which is to be held in the parlors of the church on Thursday, the twenty-third. The delightful arrangement between the Presbyterian and Episcopal churches in having their bazaars on alternate years has been in vogue now in Highland Park for several years, and has been the means of more closely identifying the common interests of these churches, located so closely to each other, and evinces a very happy co-operation and fellowship.

The Presbyterian ladies in charge of the bazaar have decided to make it a one-day bazaar, beginning in the morning, at ten-thirty and continuing to six in the evening, luncheon being served at noon. The various committees in charge of the different booths are hard at work on their plans and materials, and promise some very novel surprises and unusual features in store for the large number that will attend. Everybody is invited to go to the bazaar.

The funds to be raised by the bazaar, which aside from the social feature of such events is always an important part of the program, are to be applied to present pledges and obligations of the Dorcas Society (including part payment for the decoration of the chapel and parlors of the church, etc.) while the balance will be donated to the Presbyterian Home, which is now located in Highland Park.

During the residence of the Home in Highland Park its members and interests have greatly endeared themselves to our people, who have become interested also in the larger plans and purposes of the Home. Through the kindness of Mrs. H. P. Davidson and family the old buildings of the Northwestern Military and Naval Academy have been tendered the Directors of the Home for a time until some permanent arrangement is made. Tentative plans have been adopted by the Board of Directors of the Home for a beautiful and commodious new building, and work will be started on it as soon as sufficient funds are available. The building is to cost about \$100,000.00; and it is the purpose of the directors to raise an equal amount for endowment and maintenance. Already about \$35,000. for building and \$35,000 for endowment have been pledged. It is expected now to push this plan to a speedy consummation; asking the churches of Chicago and environs to give their several support.

The Alpha chapter of the Westminster Guild met with Mrs. Harry A. Parkin, E. Laurel Avenue, yesterday afternoon. The Guild has chosen for its studies this winter, the subject of Latin America.

The Dorcas society held an all day meeting in the parlors of the church Monday, and will meet every Monday now until after the Bazaar in November, for which the ladies are making preparation.

Next Sunday morning the pastor will speak on "What we owe to Martin Luther and the Protestant Reformation." October 31st being the Four Hundredth Anniversary of his nailing the Theses on the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg. This event is being observed throughout the country.

The next Vesper service will be held next Sunday afternoon at half past four o'clock.

Mr. George R. Jones, violinist, Mr. Day Williams, violin cello, and Mr. Allan Benedict, organist will give the program.
