stores around the same. Thus, the line of travel is brought up to the store and the merchants' end is thereby well served and the first requisite of a successful store, (practical location) taken care of.

The street around the fountain should be as wide as possible with a park in its center and the fountain of monumental proportion, the cost of which, together with pergolas, (if such are desirable) and planting, to be raised by popular subscription.

The buildings shown in my drawing are necessarily preliminary and subject to revision according to the need. No building line restrictions are required by this plan, save common ordinary sense and regard for the first principles of architectural beauty. With the start made, such as I indicate, we can trust to the good sense of future builders.

As to the need of a business section at the Ravinia station, there can be no question. The question is only will we meet this need before irreparable damage is done when it would cost a hundredfold to undo, what by lack of sight might be permitted now.

The part of the city served by Ravinia Station represents fully close

to one half of the area of the entire city. This realized, it is simple to draw the future. The day will come when the south end of the town will have comparatively as many inhabitants and correspondingly as many needs as the north end. The City's center lies a little north of Beech street—and there is a vast area south of that line that awaits developments,—and develop it will! But it must be lead in the right channel and a truly beautiful city will result—a place sought after by people seeking homes.

Planting trees and shrubs alone will not make a city beautiful if the arrangements of streets and architecture of the buildings violate every principle of logic and beauty, no more than an ugly face can be made beautiful by liberal application of the rouge. And aside of all these reasons enumerated, it is in everyone's interest as a property owner, and it is in the interest of the City as a tax collector to improve the town to its utmost capability. Foresight must replace hindsight and in planning ahead, we must plan for a maximum and not waste time, money and energy on propositions of punitive character.
