BATHING AND BOILING.

Japan's Famous Hot Baths That Are Really and Truly Hot. At the Kusatsu hot springs in Japan bathing is a species of parboiling that tries the epidermis as well as the endurance of even the Japanese who are accustomed to take a hot bath daily. It is the so-called "time bath." At this spa four baths taken at stated intervals are the rule. Before taking a bath in a public bathhouse at the word of command from the bath master all bathers take long deal boards in hand and together stir up the water in the large tub for about an hour to cool it down to a bearable temperature. Then they kneel in rows along the edge of the tub and each pours 100 to 200 dipperfuls of hot water over his head to prevent congestion on entering the water. At the second command they all go in, very slowly and carefully. The temperature of the water is 50 degrees C. (122 degrees F), and a bath is not to exceed three minutes. The bath master calls out at intervals (in Japanese, of course), "Two minutes remain," "Only one minute," "Put up with it a bit," "Perseverance is necessary," and finally, "Now, then, get out." Confusion ensues, all leaping out with great alacrity, being eager to escape from the ordeal they have been undergoing. A similar process is gone through by each of the rows of bathers who stand along the side of the tub waiting for their turn.—Exchange.

Fill Whatever Job You Hold to the Best of Your Ability. "In climbing the ladder of success what have you learned that you could pass on as aid to other struggling young men?" I asked H. P. The simple course I took saved the bank a good deal of money."—B. C. Forbes in Leslie's. Eggs Sterilized by Gas. A method of preserving eggs which is said to keep them absolutely fresh for an indefinite length of time is in use in France. New laid eggs in tin cases holding 1,000 each are placed in an autoclave, from which the air is exhausted until all the gas within the shells has been drawn out. Then carbonic acid gas and nitrogen are introduced from tanks of these gases in liquid form, and the tins containing the eggs are sealed with solder. Any germs of decay are killed by these gases, and it is said that the flavor of the eggs is in no way affected. Canals of Venice. The canals of Venice are a part of the Adriatic sea. The city is built on 115 small islands or shoals in the gulf of Venice. These islets are connected by several hundred bridges, and the direction of the canals, of which there are nearly 200, are so formed as to constitute the "highways." This it is due to the situation of this city and not to special intention of man that it has canals instead of paved streets.
