Pumice Stone. Pumice is an acid volvanic rock. which may be in either massive or finely comminuted form. It owes its peculiar porous, vesicular or pumiceous condition to the rapid expansion of included moisture or gases, due to sud den release of pressure at the time of its ejection from the volcano. This expansion may be carried to such an extent that the rock is completely shattered, and the resultant finely powdered material may be carried to unknown distances by wind and air currents and then deposited in beds several feet thick.

Eggs Sterilized by Gas. A method of preserving eggs wh is said to keep them absolutely fresh for an indefinite length of time is is use in France. New laid eggs in the cases holding 1,000 each are placed in an autoclave, from which the air is exhausted until all the gas within the shells has been drawn out. Then carbonic acid gas and nitrogen are introduced from tanks of these gases in liquid form, and the tins containing the eggs are sealed with, solder, Any germs of decay are killed by these gases, and it is said that the flavor of the eggs is in no way affected.
