ILLINOIS NEWS BRIEFS

William N. Baltz, former congressman, has been elected president of the First National bank at Millstadt. Due to the loss of the grounds, the Rock Island Gun club has dissolved, no other location for trap shooting being available.

Verne Bartlett, seventeen years old, was shot in the foot and dangerously wounded by a companion, while at play at Hanson.

The Rev. H. Atwood Percival, for ten years rector of St. Paul's Episcopal church, is dead at Peoria, following a long illness.

William Cathead has contributed \$5,000 toward the pension fund that is being raised for retired Methodist Episcopal clergymen.

All officers were re-elected at a meeting at Peoria of the Illinois Live Stock association. J. G. Imboden of Decatur is president.

Rev. J. K. Niles, pastor of St. Mary's Catholic church, is having plans drawn for a parochial school, to accommodate about 200 pupils.

A convention of ice cream manufacturers of southern Illinois was held at Alton Jan. 11. Sanitation and sale of pure ice cream were discussed.

Several hundred firemen were in attendance at the season of the convention of the Illinois State Firemen's association at Bushnell.

George T. Chamberlain of Rockford, lost his life when he dived from a platform at Waikiki beach, Honolulu, and struck his head on a coral reef.

Three women were killed and six persons injured when an Illinois Central freight train backed into a street car at the South Main street crossing at Rockford.

Suffering an attack of heart disease, Mrs. William Brown, wife of a farmer at Nora, fell across the kitchen stove while preparing breakfast and was burned to death.

Florence Baldwin, community nurse at Joliet, asked a meeting of persons interested in public health to prevent the marriage of a girl known to be mentally deficient.

Misses Elizabeth and Theresa Klunk, sisters, living near Edwardsville, eloped with Albert Webb and Grant Schnaare, both of Staunton, in a double marriage.

Henry T. Baldwin, former mayor and pioneer resident of Peoria, died at Rockford. Mr. Baldwin was eighty-one years old and moved to Rockford thirteen years ago.

Worry because her husband had been crippled for life is believed to have caused Mrs. Benjamin Peterson of Hamilton to commit suicide. Her body was found hanging in a silo chute.

Miss Isolda Ressel, 18 years old, of East St. Louis, led her class in bacteriology at a recent examination in the College of Physicians and Surgeons, St. Louis. The other members were all men.

Madison county constables may no longer receive remuneration from the county for their services in state cases. County Auditor Frank Troeckler announced that in future all such claims would be stricken out.

That a city is not responsible for the accidental death of an employe when the latter did not take ordinary precautions was held by the Illinois supreme court in the case of Policeman Harry Marshall of Pekin.

William B. Boltenstern was arrested for killing a fine buck deer, and fined \$50. The deer was about four years old and is supposed to have been driven by dogs out of the state game preserve in Ogle county.

Auditor of State Andrew Russell has issued a permit to John A. Schmitke, Emil Sigwalt, Frank Forke, Anton J. Behn and Henry Hartmann to organize a state bank at Wheeling with a capital stock of \$25,000.

Allen Carnes, head of the investigation bureau of the federal internal revenue department for the Springfield district, has been transferred to Portland, Ore., it is announced. Mr. Carnes will be succeeded by W. P. Smith of Louisville, Ky.

"Mary," the favorite waitress of Abraham Lincoln when the great emancipator visited Danville and was a guest at the McCormack house when on his circuit-riding tours, is dead. She was the widow of Charles Lord, whom she married in 1858.

The Illinois Live Stock Breeders' association at the concluding session of a four-day meeting elected the following officers: President, Charles Adkins, Bement, re-elected; vice president, Earl Meharry, Tolono, and secretary, A. T. Peters, Peoria.

Using an X-ray photograph, Dr. C. H. Starkel, a Belleville surgeon, forced together two sections of the spinal column of George Korte, without injuring the spinal cord, and the broken back now is mending. Korte, who is sixty-two, was injured by falling from a wagon.

The principle of state rights and the power of the public utilities commission of Illinois to fix transportation rates were upheld in a decision given by Federal Judge Landis, who denied a petition of twenty-nine railroads for an injunction restraining the state from enforcing the 2 cent passenger rate.

Fire destroyed the division offices of the Illinois Central railway at Freeport and the combined freight houses of both the Illinois Central and the Chicago & North Western railways. The loss is estimated at \$150,000. Still greater loss was caused by another fire which destroyed the plant of the Rawleigh Schryer company, makers of gasoline engines.
