DEATHS

Agnes Leonard Hill
Mrs. Agnes Leonard Hill, poet, essayist and lecturer, died at the Presbyterian hospital Chicago on Saturday at the age of 75. She was born in Louisville, Ky., Jan. 20, 1842, and came to Chicago in the early '60s. In the '70s and '80s she was an editorial contributor to the principal Chicago dailies.

In her later life Mrs. Hill engaged in evangelistic work both in this country and England.

She is survived by one son, Percy L. Hill of New York City, and three daughters, Mrs. Edith S. Leonard, Mrs. William Arthur Voyce, and Miss Marie Olive Hill of Highland Park. Services were held at Grace-land cemetery, Monday afternoon.

Mrs. Hill was well known on the North Shore, having first made her home in Highland Park in 1879.

In addition to writing for the Chicago papers Mrs. Hill contributed verse and essays to various magazines, and also published several books on philosophical and social topics.

She gave lectures in different parts of the United States, particularly at universities, on Education and English Literature.

Mrs. Hill's later life was given almost wholly to evangelical work.

In accordance with her expressed wish, the remains were cremated.

Her children, seeking to summarize her life in a few words, had this inscription engraved on the urn:

That which is Mortal of
AGNES LEONARD HILL
January 20, 1842
January 20, 1917

An Intelligent Woman
An Exalted Christian
A Good Mother
