Saloon Question. Old Lake Co. Resident Dies. Stock Harbor With Fish

O'Neill's Mind Unbalanced

Relatives of Joseph O'Neill, a wellknown hardware merchant of Lake Forest, have found it necessary to send him to Florida for the winter in the hopes of improving his mental condition. They left with him on Friday, January 26. For some weeks O'Neill has been showing marked times of mental abberation. Lately he has carried some sensational advertising and made remarkable claims about the sale of a certain brand of washing machine.

He claimed to have sold \$10,000 worth of machines inside of a week, and dozens and dozens of machines were delivered at homes where they were never ordered and where the people in the house had never had any negotiation with him.

O'Neill would call people up at midnight or two, three or four o'clock in the morning and converse with them relative to the prospective purchase of one of the washing machines. He seemed to have washing machines "on the brain" and while he sold a number of the machines in question, the orders for hundreds of machines which he sent into the it so took them by surprise that they made an investigation and accordingly later refused to ship any machines.

not have the right to prevent the balloting. The case was appealed, and his decision was affirmed. From the appellate court, it went to the supreme court, and the members of the highest tribunal sustained the lower courts in their rulings.

As result, the entire process is expected to be repeated by advocates of the saloon, and a stirring fight is anticipated. Other townships, which voted on the question last spring. are prevented from repeating their efforts for another year, at least.
