### -OUR EYES-

Eyes have been called the "Windows of the Soul." It is probable because the Soul looks out through them, and observes the

The light rays that enter the normal eye are brought to a focus upon the retina, and that there is then an image or picture of the object produced there, and that this picture is transmitted by the nerve fibres, which compose the retina, to the brain, and that the brain transmits it to the mind or soul, and we see.

And what is the retina like, or what may we liken it to? It is made up of uncountable fibres or nerves, each one of which leads to the brain, like each wire of a telephone system leads to a central office, or perhaps the web or net of a spider is a better illustration of the retina-the purpose of the net being the catching of insects and that of the retina the clutching of images. From what is known of the web and of the retina, they seem to be much alike. The spider in building his net runs lines from a central point out in every direction, attaching them to whatever suits his purpose, These lines usually form a sort of cornucopia or horn of plenty shape. After these radiating lines are all in place he weaves into them circular ones. These he places very close together at the center, but as he gets away from the center he places them farther and farther apart, so that the meshes of his net become larger and larger as the periphery is approached. When this cunning little creature has his net complete he hides himself back in the horn, with his feet resting on the radiating lines, so that if one of them be touched he knows exactly which one it is, and therefore exactly
