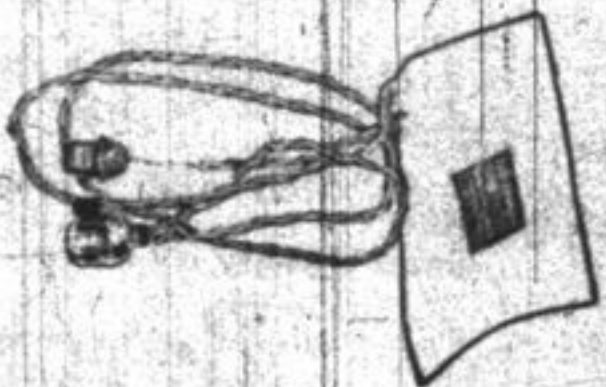

GUS PETERSON KILLED ELMER LARSON INJURED

Hit by C. & N. W. Train at Farwell's Crossing, Lake Forest Last Sunday

The act of walking from behind one train into the path of another claimed two more victims in Lake county Sunday afternoon, when Gustave Adolph Peterson was instantly killed and Elmer Larsen sustained serious injuries, when struck by a Chicago & Northwestern train at Farwell's crossing near Lake Forest at about 12:52 p. m.

Both of the victims were well known in Highland Park, and Mr. Peterson was a member of the local Masonic lodge.

Peterson was instantly killed, it is believed, while Larsen sustained a fracture of both arms, his leg was broken and he is believed to have been internally injured. Peterson was removed to a morgue while Larsen was rushed to the Alice Home hospital where it is feared he may die.

The two men were taking a walk, starting from their home shortly after the noon meal. When they reached the railroad crossing their way was blocked by a moving northbound train. As the last car passed they started across. Both stepped in front of a fast moving southbound train.

Larsen was thrown from the right of way by the force of the collision a few feet south of where he was struck, but Peterson was carried about twenty-five feet. The latter was lifeless when found by the members of the train crew and others who ran to his assistance.

An examination of the remains of Peterson proved that he had sustained a fractured skull and other terrible injuries. The inquest was held over the remains Monday morning and a verdict of accidental death returned by the jury.

Both of the men are married. Larsen has several small children.
