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**DIAMONDS AND LENSES**  
In the rough state, the value would not be great, between the diamond and the ordinary white stone, or between the flint or crown glass over the common glass. It is the cutting and the polishing that gives the brilliancy to the diamond and the grinding and polishing of the lenses to correct the error of the eye that makes them valuable. It is said one Chicago man worked six months on one lens and sold the lens for \$6,000.00.

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
