On Monday afternoon a very interesting talk on "Safety First" was given to the pupils by Mrs. Riddle.



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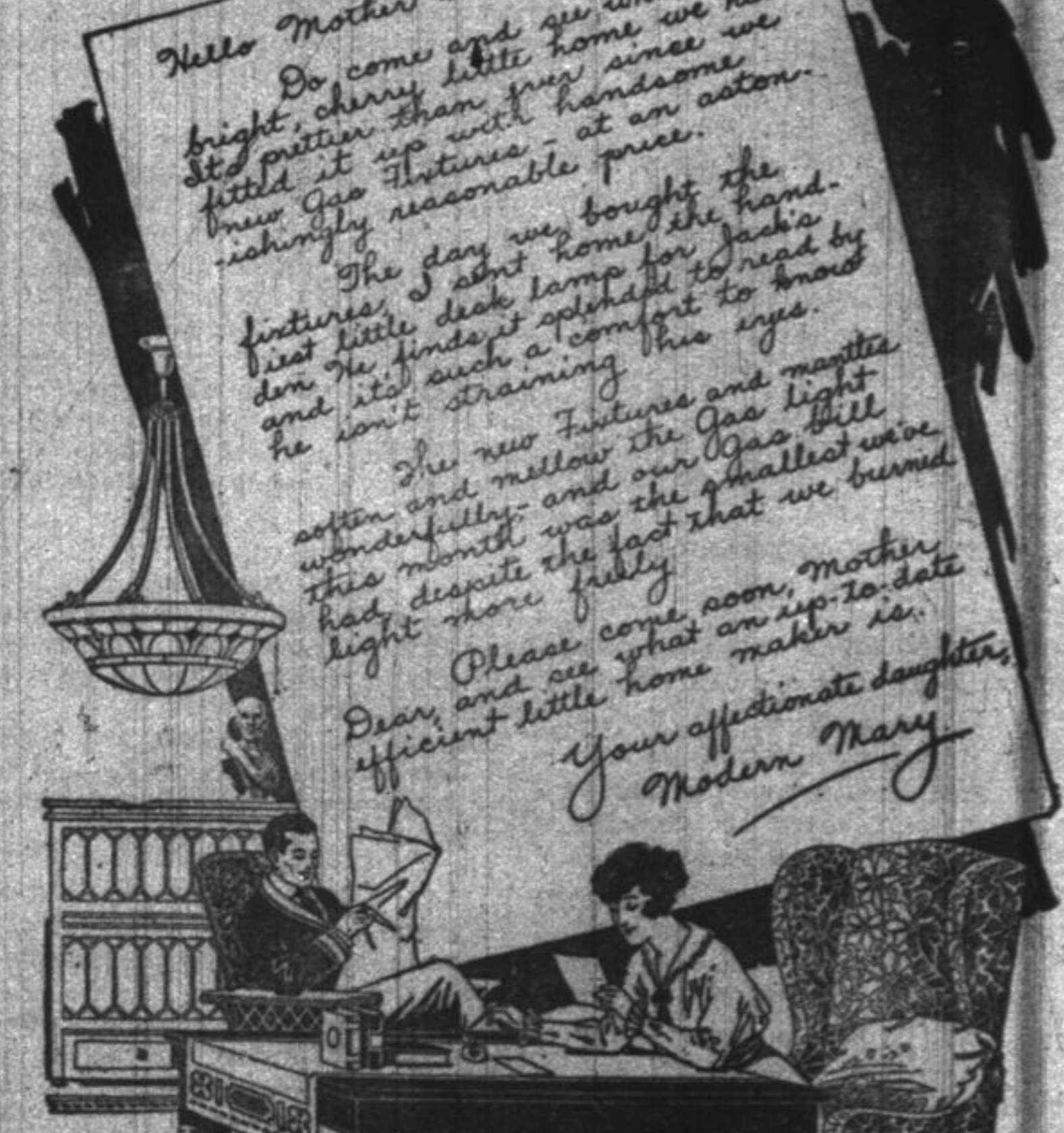
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
