The three stretches of Sheridan Road to be dedicated shortly represent one of the longest stretches of permanently paved highway around Chicago. Continued from Page 1. Like to live where there were no trees. There are few birds where there are no trees. They have no place to make their homes. Taking away the trees takes away the protection from our tender fruit trees. Where there are no trees the snows melt and go away too rapidly; the moisture that should sink into the soil is carried away in floods. Because our forests are taken away we have severe droughts every year. One full-grown elm tree gives out 15 tons of moisture in 24 hours. A large sunflower plant gives off 3 pints of water in one day. The trees give us lumber, fuel, wood, pulp for newspapers, cork, bark for tanning, wild fruits, nuts, resin, turpentine, oils, and various products for medicines.
