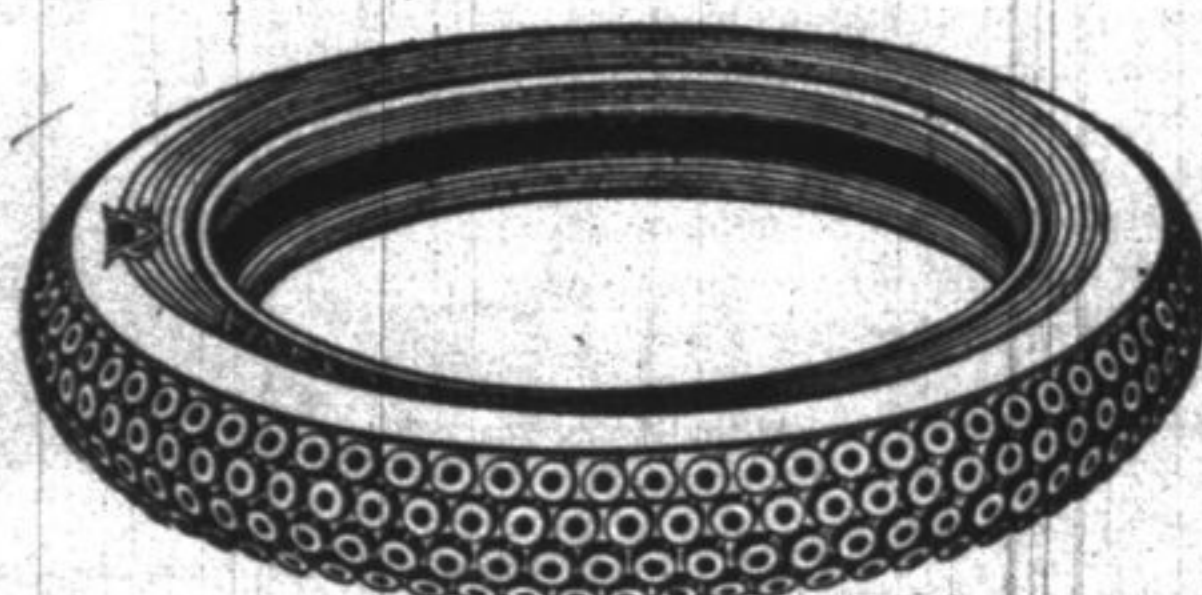

### AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE PARKING OF AUTOMOBILES

Be it Ordained by the Council of the City of Highland Park:

SECTION 1. No person owning, controlling, driving or operating any automobile, carriage or other vehicle, propelled or drawn by animal or other power, shall cause or permit the same to stand in any public street or alley of said city for a longer period than one hour at a time, excepting on Central Avenue, between the west line of North Sheridan Road and the east line of Green Bay Road.

SECTION 2. Any person, firm or corporation violating any provision of this Ordinance, shall be subject to a fine of not less than One Dollar, or more than Five Dollars for each and every violation.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication.

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING ANY PERSON UNDER SIXTEEN (16) YEARS OF AGE AND ANY PERSON UNDER EIGHTEEN (18) YEARS OF AGE AND OVER SIXTEEN (16) YEARS OF AGE, UNLESS LICENSED SO TO DO TO OPERATE AN AUTOMOBILE OR MOTOR VEHICLE IN ANY STREET AVENUE OR PUBLIC PLACE, IN ENUE OR PUBLIC PLACE, IN CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK.

Be it Ordained by the Council of the City of Highland Park:

SECTION 1. That no person under the age of sixteen (16) years and no person who is under the age of eighteen years, and over the age of sixteen (16) years, unless licensed so to do, in the manner hereinafter provided, shall drive or operate any automobile or motor vehicle in, upon or through any street, avenue or public place within the City of Highland Park.

SECTION 2. That no person who is the owner of any automobile or motor vehicle shall permit any person who is under sixteen (16) years of age or any person who is under eighteen (18) years of age and over sixteen (16) years of age, unless licensed so to do in the manner hereinafter provided, to drive or operate any automobile or motor vehicle in, upon or through any street, avenue or public place, within the City of Highland Park.

SECTION 3. That any person under the age of eighteen (18) years and over the age of sixteen (16) years desiring to secure a license to operate an automobile or motor vehicle in any street, avenue or public place within the City of Highland Park, shall make application in writing therefor to the City Clerk upon a form provided for that purpose, and thereupon the Council shall, in its discretion, order the issuance of such license to such applicants as are qualified to drive or operate such automobile or motor vehicle, upon the signing of such application by the applicant and the payment to the City Clerk of a fee of Five Dollars (\$5.00) for each license. The said license may be revoked by the Council at any time upon good cause.

SECTION 4. Every person, firm or corporation violating the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction be fined not less than Five Dollars (\$5.00) nor more than Twenty-Five (\$25.00) Dollars for every offense.

SECTION 5: This ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication.

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE USE OF HEADLIGHTS ON AUTOMOBILES AND OTHER VEHICLES

Be it Ordained by the Council of the City of Highland Park:

SECTION 1. That no person shall use or have upon any automobile, carriage of other vehicle, within the City of Highland Park, any acetylene, electric, or other bright headlight, the rays from which shall be intensified by any parabolic or condensing lens in front of the light, or any parabolic or condensing reflector, unless such headlight shall be properly shaded so as not to blind or dazzle the eyes of other users of the highways, or make it unsafe or difficult for them to ride, drive or walk thereon.

SECTION 2. Any person, firm or corporation violating any provision of this Ordinance, shall be subject to a fine of not less than One Dollar, or more than Five Dollars for each and every violation.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication.

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE PLACING AND MAINTAINING OF SIGNS SUSPENDED INTO THE STREET OR OVER THE SIDEWALK.

Be it Ordained by the Council of the City of Highland Park:

SECTION 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to place on or suspend from any building, structure or lot any sign so that the same will project from the front or wall of such building, structure or lot into the street or over the sidewalk.

SECTION 2. All signs now maintained by any person, firm or corporation, placed on or suspended from any building, structure or lot, so that the same projects from the front or wall of such building, structure or lot into the street or over the sidewalk, shall be removed within sixty (60) days from the date of the passage, approval and due publication of this ordinance. Whoever shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not less than Five Dollars
