The threatened epidemic of Scarlet Fever in our city appears at present to be well under control. This result we believe is due to prompt and energetic action on the part of your health department in co-operation with the school authorities.

During the approaching vacation all of the pupils will be at large with no opportunity for the authorities to inspect or keep in touch with the state of their health.

We propose especial care in the reopening of the schools in order that no contagion be introduced.

Therefore all pupils of all public schools, who report upon reentering, having had illness of any sort, will be required to furnish a physician's certificate of freedom from contagion. Will you have your child—if it be in this class—bring such a certificate and thus avoid the delay and inconvenience of being sent home. Health Department.
