

## A LECTURE ON CHRISTIAN SCIENCE

### Introductory Remarks Given by Robert P. Walker of Hubbard Woods. Good Crowd Tuesday Evening

Paul Stark Seeley, C. S. spoke to the general public at the First Church of Christ, Scientist, on Tuesday evening on "Christian Science." The seating capacity of the church was over taxed; a great number of people who arrived late were forced to stand outside. The speaker was introduced by Mr. Robert P. Walker who spoke as follows:

Friends, this Church bids you a cordial welcome.

Mary Baker Eddy, the Discoverer and Founder of Christian Science, made ample provision that the public might have unlimited opportunity to get a right understanding of the subject of Christian Science.

First, in 1875, she published the Christian Science text book, "Science and Health, with Key to the Scriptures," afterwards various other of her writings including Miscellaneous Writings, Unity of Good, and the Mother Church Manual.

She established the Christian Science Journal and was its first editor and publisher. She authorized the publication of the Christian Science Sentinel, Der Herold, and the Christian Science Monitor, the latter a daily newspaper.

She organized the Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Massachusetts and provided for the formation of Branch Churches and Societies of which there are today over 1700. These churches hold regular Sunday services and Wednesday evening meetings. The Sunday service includes a lesson-sermon composed of Scriptural texts and correlative passages from the Christian Science text book. The Wednesday evening meeting includes the reading of a short Scriptural selection and correlative passages from the Christian Science text book; also testimonies, experiences and remarks on Christian Science.

The Mother Church and Branch Churches maintain free reading rooms, committees for the free distribution of Christian Science literature; also Publication Committees, whose duty it is to correct in an orderly manner mis-statements of Christian Science as published various newspapers and periodicals.

Mrs. Eddy further provided the Board of Lectureship, of the Mother Church, whose mission it is to correct misconceptions of Christian Science and to bear testimony to the facts pertaining to her life.

We have with us tonight a member of that Board, one who comes well qualified to speak on the subject of Christian Science.

I take pleasure in presenting Paul Stark Seeley, C. S., who will address you.

The teachings of Christian Science, as is generally known, have to do with man's thinking, but in just what way is not so well understood. The Discoverer and Founder of Christian Science, Mary Baker Eddy, in her work entitled "Miscellaneous Writings," says of this Science, "Its genius is right thinking and right acting" (p. 365), and in another of her works, "No and Yes," she says, "The essence of this Science is right thinking and right acting" (p. 12). Man's actions are the expression of his thoughts. Let us then consider what constitutes right thinking, its effect upon the life of man, and the way by which one may learn so to think and thereby gain the benefits.

### Importance of Thought, in Human Affairs

We are all deeply interested, whether we have considered the fact of not, in the subject of thought. Our thoughts are in fact the most important thing in the world to each one of us. We are primarily interested in our own thoughts for there we find our sense of life and existence. We are also interested in the thoughts of relatives, friends, our business associates and in the thinking of society as a whole. We cannot fail to agree that this is the most essential of all things to carry on the world's affairs. In thought government is based, law has its foundation, business is conceived and carried on, human relations.
