ELM PLACE SCHOOL

The pupils plan to give a matinee and evening exhibit at some time next week, which will illustrate the great variety of materials used in teaching the various subjects on the course of study. Each of the rooms in the Elm Place Building will be fitted up with tables and shelving and materials laid out in orderly fashion. These will be under the care of the children who will explain to visitors the various details of the exhibit.

There will be rather complete displays of various minerals showing the ores, the method of reduction, their use in manufactures, etc., and there will be very complete collections showing the various forms in which limestone, carbon, quartz, etc., appear. There will be a collection of birds nests and collections showing the life-histories of insects like the trap-door spider, etc. One room will display a large collection of flags illustrating the history of the American flag, and will have various historical pictures on exhibition. Another room will be given up to materials used by the pioneers, furniture, etc. Still another will have Indian implements, articles of clothing, etc. Another room will have collections of miniature agriculture implements, pictures illustrating agricultural processes. Another will show dairying and processes of distributing of milk products, etc. The program will be informal and the visitors will be expected to move from collection to collection and the children will be prepared to answer inquiries about the nature of the various exhibits and the use made of them in our school work. Printed invitations will be sent out, but all are invited to come whether such an invitation falls into their hands or not.
