AN ORDINANCE FIXING THE SALARY OF CITY OFFICERS AND CERTAIN EMPLOYES OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK, ILLINOIS.

Be It Ordained by the Council of the City of Highland Park:

SECTION 1. That the salaries of the following City Officers and Employees, for the fiscal year beginning May 1st, 1917 and ending April 30th, 1918, be fixed at such sum as is provided for by this ordinance for such officer or employe, for the discharge of the duties of such office, as required under the laws of the State of Illinois, and the ordinances of the City of Highland Park, during the term of his office or employment, and that such officer or employe shall receive no further compensation from the City of Highland Park for the duties of such office during the term thereof.

That the salary of the Mayor be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Two Hundred Fifty (\$250.00) Dollars per annum.

That the salary of each of the Commissioners be and it is hereby fixed at the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) per annum.

That the salary of the City Collector be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Two Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$2,400.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Corporation Counsel be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Eighteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,800.00) per annum.

That the salary of the City Treasurer be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Six Hundred Dollars (\$600.00) per annum.

That the salary of the City Collector be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Thirteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,300.00) per annum.

That the salary of the City Marshal be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Twelve Hundred Dollars (\$1,200.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Assistant Marshal be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Three Hundred Dollars (\$1,300.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Police Officers No. 1 and No. 2 be and it is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) per annum.

That the salary of Police Officer No. 3 be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Nine Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$950.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Water Works Engineer be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Fourteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,400.00) per annum.

That the salary of the First and Second Assistant Engineers at the Water Works be and it is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Helper at the Water Works be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Foreman of Public Works be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand and Sixty Dollars (\$1,060.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Sanitary and Water Meter Inspector be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Dollars (1,000.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Assistant City Clerk be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Twelve Hundred Dollars (\$1,200.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Assistant City Treasurer be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (300.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Stenographer in the City Clerk's Office be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Twelve Hundred Dollars (\$1,200.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Time Keeper be and the same is fixed at the sum of Nine Hundred Dollars (\$900.00) per annum.

That the salary of the City Fireman in charge of the Fire Station (during the day) be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) per annum.

That the salary of the City Fireman in charge of the Fire Station (during the night) be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Six Hundred Dollars (\$600.00) per annum.

That the salary of the General Helper in the Department of Public Health and Safety be and is hereby fixed at the sum of Nine Hundred Dollars (\$900.00) per annum.

That the salary of the man in charge of the Garbage Incinerator Plant be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Seven Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$780.00) per annum.

SECTION 2. That the salaries provided for in Section One of this ordinance shall be due and payable in semi monthly installments on the first and fifteenth day of each month for the preceding half month of their service during the term of their office.

SECTION 3. That the salary of

the Mayor, Commissioners, City Clerk, Corporation Counsel, City Marshal, Assistant City Marshal, City Police Officers and Stenographer shall be paid from the Salary of Officers Fund provided for in the Department of Public Affairs.

That the salary of the City Treasurer, Assistant City Treasurer, Assistant to the City Clerk, City Collector and Time Keeper shall be paid from the salary of Officers Fund provided for in the Department of Accounts and Finances.

That the salary of the Sanitary and Water Meter Inspector, Engineer at the Water Works, First and Second Assistant Engineers at the Water Works, Helper at the Water Works, Helper in the Water Department, Day and Night Fireman at the Fire Station, shall be paid from the Salary Fund provided for in the Department of Public Health and Safety.

That the salary of the Foreman of Public Works shall be paid from the Salary Fund provided for in the Department of Streets and Public Improvements.

That the salary of the man in charge of the Garbage Incinerator plant shall be paid from the Garbage Fund.

SECTION 4. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 5. This ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication.

The members of the Highland Park Defense Council, appointed by the Mayor, are George F. Bock, George A. Mason, Otho H. Morgan, Fred D. Porter and Frank L. Wean. The mayor is ex-officio a member. At the Sunday afternoon meeting the following officers were elected: George A. Mason, president, Frank L. Wean, vice-president; Fred D. Porter, secretary and George F. Bock, treasurer.

The Defense Council consists of the above mentioned five members and the chairman of each of the five committees. These committees, their membership and duties are as follows:

Patrol Committee. Earl W. Spencer, chairman; George O. Fairweather, Lucius A. Hine, Dr. H. B. Roberts, and E. A. Turpin. The duties of the committee are to train a patrol force, which will hold itself in readiness to assist the police, patrol, and aid in taking a census.

Finance Committee. H. S. Vail, chairman; Noble Crandall, Curtis N. Kimball, Arthur W. Vercoe and Ward W. Willis. The duties of the committee are to raise by private subscription, the funds required in excess of what the local authorities may appropriate. The money will be used to finance the object of the Defense Council.

Americanization Committee. John M. Tuttle, chairman; Richmond Dean, Frank G. Gardner, R. S. Kirchberger, and George A. Schofield. The duties of the committee are to eliminate racial friction, stimulate patriotism and warn alien enemies resident in the community.

Conservation and Relief Committee. Wm. R. Ruffner, chairman; Henry T. Adamson, Roland Hastings, Fayette S. Munro and John Oliver. The duties of the committee are to cooperate with local relief agencies, take charge of the distribution of relief recommended by the Finance Committee and not otherwise provided for, and to take care of the families and dependents of those who have gone into the army.

Labor Bureau and Census Committee. James H. Duffy, chairman; Albert Larson, Solomon A. St. Peter, George L. Vetter and Charles H. Warren. The duties of the committee are to establish a registry where employers desiring employees can file information in regard to their needs and persons desiring employment can register their qualifications, and to assist in census taking.

The following Publicity Committee was also appointed: Mrs. Robert F. Carr, chairman; Mrs. O. L. Oleson, Mrs. Ralph F. Seymour, Mrs. Carleton M. Vail and John L. Udell.

A meeting of the Defense and the Publicity Committee will be called at an early date. By-laws will be adopted and a complete roster of the council and its committees will be prepared with the name, address and telephone number of each member. Representative men have been selected for membership in the Council and on the various committees. The organization is elastic and may be enlarged or contracted as occasion requires. Simplicity is the keynote. The Mayor has sought to avoid an elaborate organization and to prevent the duplication of work already conducted by other organizations.

The Defense Council will consider

plans for a city wide Fourth of July celebration from which fireworks will be eliminated. It is hoped that a distinguished speaker may be obtained and that the High School Cadet Corps and the Business Men's Battalion may be induced to march to the thrilling music of the local band. If this plan meets with general favor it will be at once developed and detailed information given later.
