The young women's and the young men's Sunday school classes have started a membership and attendance contest.

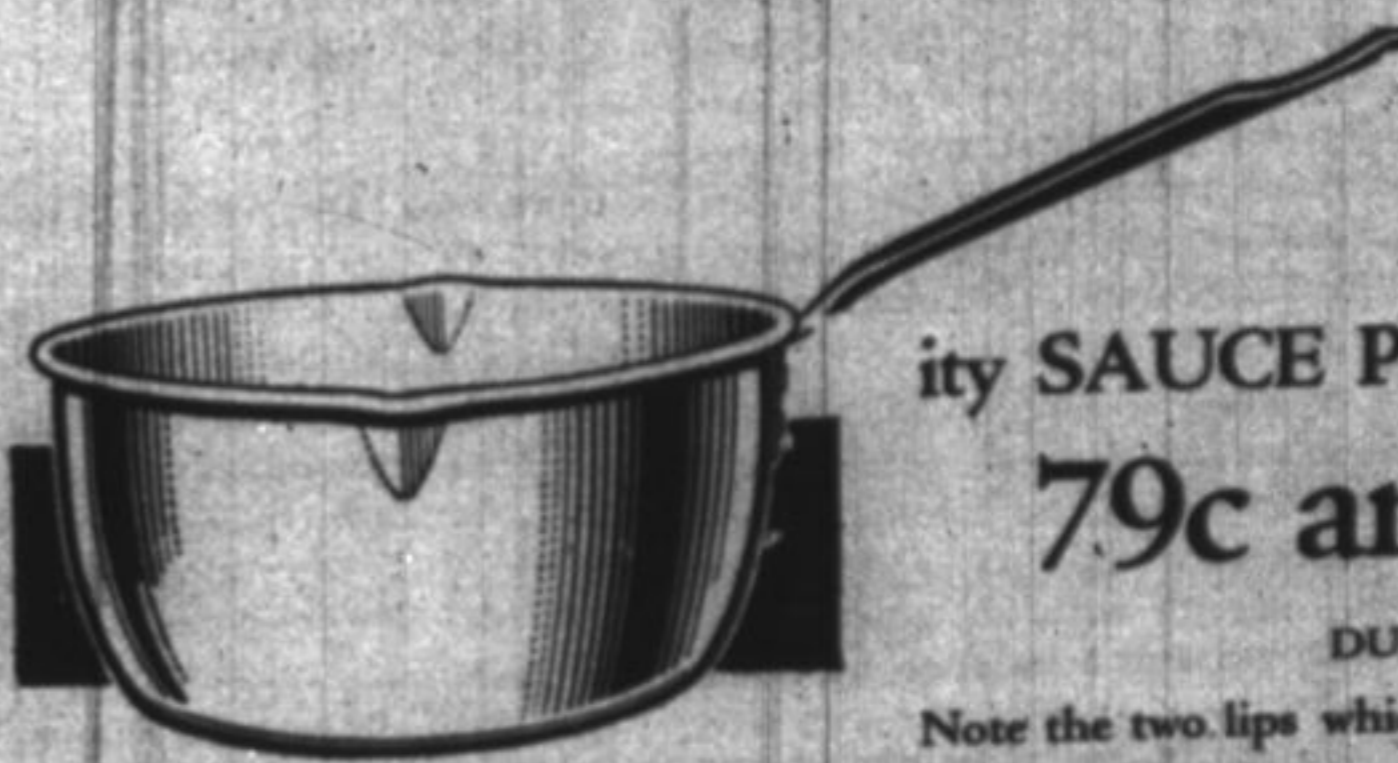
