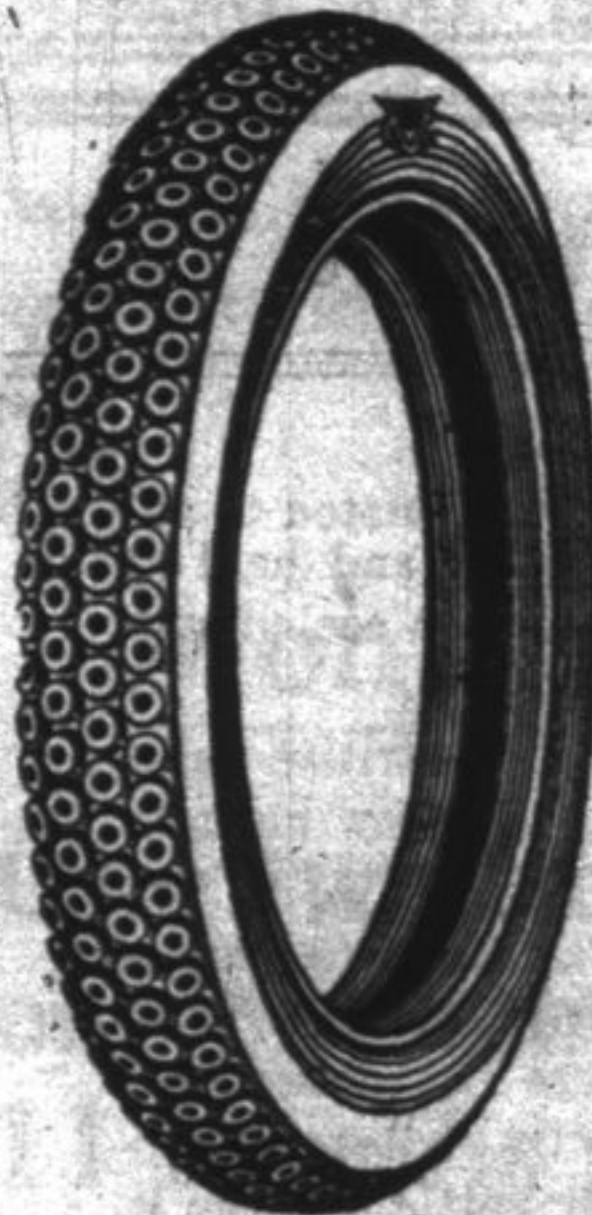

ELM PLACE SCHOOL

Friday afternoon of this week is to be given up to picnic festivities on the school grounds. The pupils are to bring their own lunches and the Parents-Teachers Association is to serve ice cream at the noon hour. The afternoon will be given up to ball game contests between the upper grades and to a sort of vaudeville program in various rooms in the building. A five cent fee will be charged for each "show". Miss Esther White's first grade pupils will re-produce the Hansel and Gretel program they gave some time ago. There will be folk dances and songs in the Kindergarten Building, and a lantern "show" in Room 6 in the Elm Place Building. At three o'clock there will be a movie program in the Auditorium. At seven o'clock in the evening Miss White's small pupils will give the Hansel and Gretel play once more and at eight o'clock there will be an illustrated musical and nature program in which the lanterns will be used in the School Auditorium. A five cent fee will be charged each time, one half of the proceeds to go to the Red Cross fund.

On Thursday of next week the afternoon will be given up to the annual Flag Day exercises. The exhibition of the pupils' work of various kinds, drawings, hand work, etc. will take place at the same time and the building will be open that evening for a continuation of the display.

The following morning the pupils will assemble for honorable mentions and that will end the school work for the year. The annual closing exercises of the eighth grade will be held that (Friday) evening in the Elm Place Auditorium.

The Elm Place Baseball team, by defeating the Highwood Grammar School team by a score of seventeen to five at the High School grounds last Thursday, has again won the championship among the grammar schools tributary to the Deserfield-Shelby High School. The Bear River Loving Cup, possession of which the team obtained by winning the championship last year, will remain at Elm Place School for another year, and the two successive victories of the Elm Place Team will be inscribed on the cup. This cup becomes the final property of the team winning the championship for three consecutive years, and the Elm Place boys are hoping to win it next year so that the cup will be a permanent possession of the school. High School graduates will be interested in the following letter written by the president of the University of Illinois:

Urbana-Champaign, Illinois, June 1, 1917.

To the Boys and Girls Graduating From Illinois High Schools In the Spring of 1917.

My Dear Friends:

I have received many letters from boys and girls about to graduate from the high schools of this State asking what they ought to do next year, as they all desire to do their "bit" in this great crisis of the nation.

I am taking the liberty of giving you some advice based on my study of the situation.

The greatest need of the nation at the present time is trained ability in all lines of social and industrial effort. The enlistment and conscription necessary to recruit the Army and Navy are taking thousands of the best young men and women of the country—a larger percentage from the ranks of college youth than from others.

On the other hand, the country will need larger and even larger numbers of young men and women of college training.

It is my opinion that you can help the country just at the present juncture by going on with your education than in any other way, preparing yourselves every day for a more efficient and larger service.

My advice then to all who can do so is: "Go to college in September and stay there if you can, until your country calls you for other duty."

Be sure that while there you use your time well. Study hard. Train yourself physically, mentally and morally to the highest efficiency.

If the war should stop when you pray God it may, you will then be on your way to serve your country in the arts of peace more efficiently than you otherwise could. If the war should be long, and you be ultimately called to the standards, you will be prepared to render the largest and most efficient service.

The Highland Park Defense Council Makes Appeal to Citizens to Remember Boys in Blue

With the increase in size of the Naval Training Station, the recreation facilities of the post have been overtaxed. As a result many of the young men are unable to find proper means of amusement. Many have never been away from home before. Homesickness is prevalent.

The Committee on Conservation and Relief of the Highland Park Defense Council appeal to the citizens of Highland Park to save all magazines and periodicals for the boys of the Naval Training Station. Either send your contributions direct or notify R. T. R. Hastings, secretary of the committee and arrangements will be made to call for and deliver them to the Station.

The Government should have power to censor news and newspapers. We are at war, and all great wars need the power or censorship. While some of our dailies are over ambitious about publishing "news" for us, they are at the same time giving information to the enemy. By publishing the arrival and departure of vessels, the German submarines may be enabled to send a transport of our soldiers to watery graves.
