ANNUAL APPROPRIATION BILL AN ORDINANCE MAKING APPROPRIATIONS FOR CORPORATE PURPOSES FOR THE FISCAL YEAR FROM MAY 1st, 1917 TO APRIL 30th, 1918.

Be it Ordained by the Council of the City of Highland Park, County of Lake and State of Illinois:

SECTION 1. That the following sums, or as much thereof as may be authorized by law, be and the same are hereby appropriated for the corporate purposes for the fiscal year commencing May first, Nineteen Hundred Seventeen and ending April Thirtieth, Nineteen Hundred Eighteen

AN ORDINANCE prohibiting any person from trespassing upon land under cultivation. Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Highland Park: SECTION 1: No person shall enter into or upon any lot, block or tract of ground in the City of Highland Park, which is now or hereafter may be under cultivation, for any person whatsoever, unless such person is the owner or lessee thereof, or the agent or licensee of either. SECTION 2: Any person who shall violate the provisions of Section 1, hereof, shall be fined not less than each offense.
