American Fund for French Wounded Meets every Wednesday at Episcopal Parish House, nine to four. Wants workers for hospital supplies and garments.

**Y. W. C. A.**  
 The Association Girls have been busy making surgical coats for the Red Cross, pajamas for the army and navy league and comfort pillows for the French wounded since the great need has been presented to them. Everywhere there seems to be a growing desire on the part of the girls to do their bit in this great struggle that we are entering. The Association Secretary has undertaken to find rooming places for the families and friends of the men who are located at Fort Sheridan and finds it a very pleasant as well as a needed line of activity. Since July 1st twenty-five have been placed. Those having rooms can call up No. 675 and list them. There is absolutely no charge for this service and the only return that is asked is that the householder will notify the secretary when the room is filled, in order to avoid duplication of effort.

**Army and Navy Centre**  
 At a meeting of the Army and Navy Center chairmen of Committees it was decided that the finance committee send out a circular to Highland Parkers, urging them to contribute fifty cents or more a month regularly for the support of the center. It is hoped that everyone who is able to do so, will make some contribution to this good work.

**Red Cross**  
 Central Red Cross Shop, Elm Place School, open every day from 9 to 4. Workers wanted for surgical dressings and garment work. A special call has come for knitted articles, especially sweaters and socks, for ambulance or comfort pillows, made of odd pieces of cretonne, size 13 inches by 17 inches, stuffed with small snipped pieces or ravelings. Wanted, 700,000 handkerchiefs, 18 inches square, made of old muslin or linen, hemmed by machine or unhemmed, plain cotton handkerchiefs costing about 5 cents are satisfactory.

Bed socks 100,000 in number are wanted, length of foot, 11 inches, made from pieces of warm material, cotton flannel, etc. Wanted, 300,000 shoulder wraps, size 2 yards long about 1 yard wide, made of daisy cloth, or similar material.

Small societies or groups of women are urged to answer these calls and deliver articles to Central Red Cross Shop, Elm Place School.
