

DERHAPS today, in response to a ring of your I telephone bell, you were answered by an operator saying, "Number, please?" and you were surprised to find no one calling you. It is probable that the person who originated the call hung up his receiver before you answered, either because he remembered that yours was not the number he wanted, or because you may have been a bit slow in answering and he did not care to wait.

In such a case the calling person's line, as well as yours, would be disconnected by the operator who originally received the call, and it is most likely that, when you responded, you were answered by a different operator, who had no knowledge of the call, and who courteously asked you to excuse it.
