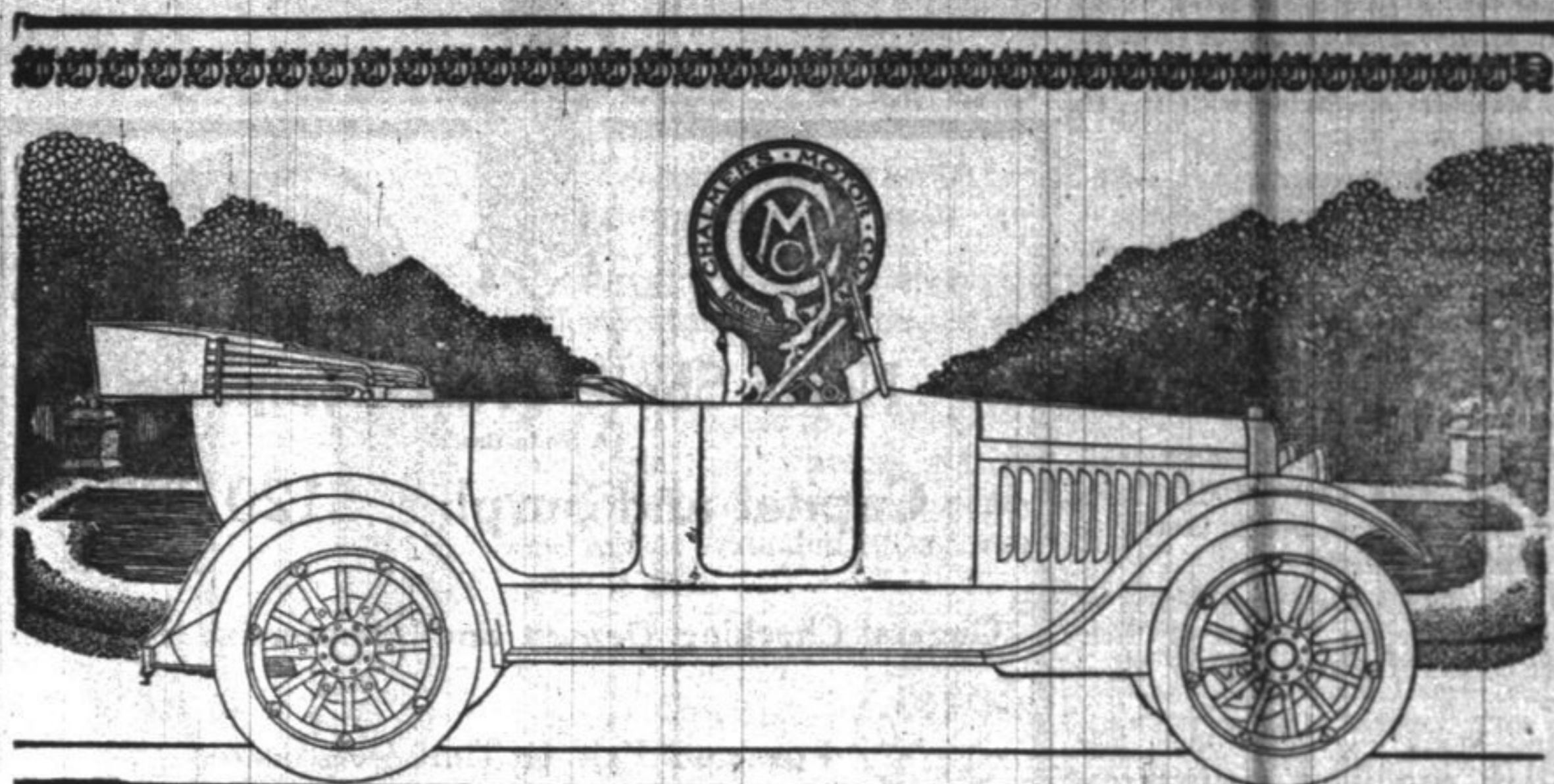

The Food Conservation Pledge cards are now ready. These cards have been given out by Mr. Hoover, food administrator and will be sent to everyone in Highland Park within a week. Please give these cards your attention.

Plans are now being made to take a registration of all the women of Highland Park. A meeting of 20 registrars was held last Saturday and although no definite date can be given now for the registration, due notice will be given. Watch the newspapers.

RED CROSS

The following notification was received last Saturday from Eliot Wadsworth, acting chairman of the American National Red Cross, by the executive secretaries of all chapters.

"On account of the urgent demand in Europe for surgical dressings, I request you to send at the earliest possible moment all available stock of dressings to the nearest branch warehouse of the American Red Cross supply service. Since the demand is so urgent I ask you to give this your immediate personal attention."

The Highland Park Red Cross is answering this call and is sending today a full box of surgical dressings direct to the Bush terminal, N. Y. The contents of this box is the work of many Highland Park women and amounts to 5320 yards of gauze made up into surgical dressings. Come and help fill another box.

Mrs. Searey has been most successful in answering the call for room for the mothers and wives of the men at Fort Sheridan. Forty-eight rooms have been provided since July 4th.

Wanted—Sphagnum Moss

A call has come for sphagnum moss to be used for surgical dressings. Cotton is becoming prohibitive in price and is daily becoming scarcer. It has been found that sphagnum moss has many advantages over cotton for infected wounds, being lighter, cooler and more highly absorbent.

This moss grows in swampy places and may be found in the vicinity of Highland Park. Will anyone knowing anything about the moss or where it grows please communicate with Mrs. Millard phone 228.
