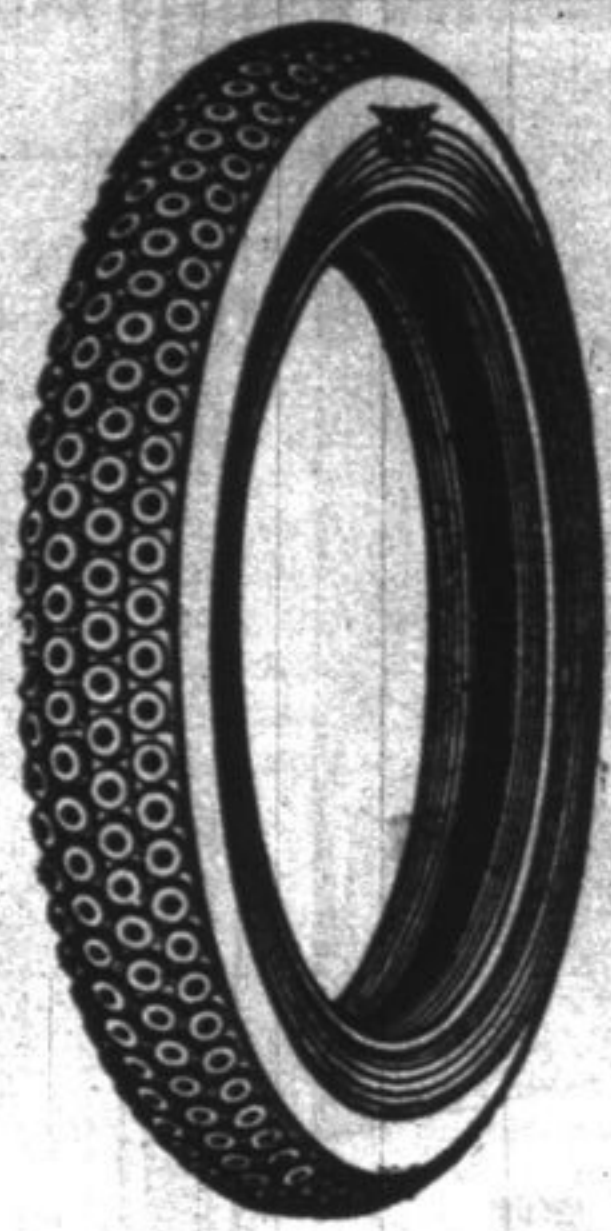

An opportunity will be given for firing the National Rifle Association 40-shot marksman course at 200 yards, target B, five shots in each of four positions in both slow and rapid fire.

It is suggested that one of the officers of your club be present and report to me or identify and vouch for your members.

The following extract from the U. S. Navy Small Arms Firing Regulations will interest you: "Teams from the Navy, Marine Corps, and Naval Militia may compete for prizes and credits with teams from Coast Guard, Army and National Guard, and with civilian or other teams." This shows that the Navy wishes to co-operate with civilian rifle clubs in furthering the aim of the National Rifle Association in promoting skill in arms among the citizens of America.

Captain Moffett has generously offered the use of the range each Saturday to members of the rifle clubs, and I hope that your club will have a large representation here on the National Rifle Association Opening Day, so that I may meet you and explain the good things Captain Moffett has in store for rifle shooters and make arrangements for future shooting programs.
