TRAINED, SKILLED MECHANICS NEEDED

TO BE IN UNUSUAL DEMAND

Encourage the Maintaining of Proper Schools During Summer Months. Nation is Warned

Training skilled mechanics and high-grade helpers is the next step in National preparation, according to the Department of the Interior, which has sent broadcast, through the Bureau of Education, an appeal to trade schools, manual training high schools, and all schools and shop-work departments, to prepare to meet the demands that will come for semi-technical workers in the metal trades and other industries.

"It is impossible," says the Department's statement, "to forecast definitely the numbers of mechanics and operatives of various kinds that will be required. Officers of the Army, Navy, and Civil Service Commission are agreed, however, that during the next few months there will be an unusual demand for capable foremen, mechanics, and high grade helpers in a number of important occupations."

It is pointed out that the demands for these workers will come from the regular enlisted corps of the Army and Navy, from the enlisted reserve corps of the Army and Navy, from the eligible registers of the Civil Service Commission, and from private employers whose workers are called into Government service.

Maintaining schools throughout the summer months, encouraging students between 16 and 20 years of age now already enrolled to continue their training and discouraging premature entrance into industry, are urged as necessary.

There are over 500 special schools available for service of the kind indicated now on the lists of the Bureau of Education, according to the Department's statement, and these schools have been asked to notify the Commission of Education at once as to the plans that will be adopted for carrying out the suggestions of the Government.

copies may be had at a nominal cost by applying to the National Committee of Patriotic and Defense Societies, Washington, D. C. Mr. James H. Duffy, chairman of the Labor Bureau & Census Committee, reported that the taking of the census is delayed at the request of the State Council of Defense, which is preparing a uniform registration card to be used by all the municipalities along the North Shore Mr. Wm. R. Ruffner, chairman of

the committee on Conservation and Relief, recommended that closer relations should be established between the Defense Council and the Patriotic Food Growers' Association in order to avoid duplication of work. He will also arrange for the use of a canning machine, which is now in service in Lake Forest. This machine is on wheels and can be readily moved from one locality to another. Mr. George P. Bock treasurer reported a balance in the treasury of \$550.43. Several unpaid bills in connection with the 4th of July celebration were ordered paid out of the treasurer's hands.
