**CIVIL SERVICE EXAM-
 INATION AUGUST 11th**

Candidates for Clerk and Carrier
 to go Before Board at High-
 land Park Post Office

An examination for clerk and carrier
 will be held at the post office
 in this city on August 11, 1917.

Age limit, 18 to 45 years on the
 date of the examination.

Married women will not be admit-
 ted to the examination. This pro-
 hibition, however, does not apply to
 women who are divorced, but they
 are eligible for appointment only as
 clerk.

Applicants must be physically
 sound, and male applicants must be
 not less than 5 feet 4 inches in
 height in bare feet, and weigh not
 less than 125 pounds without over-
 coat or hat.

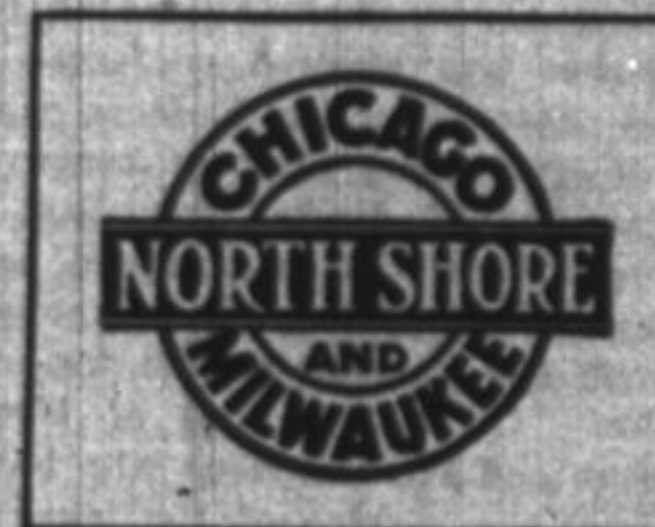
