at its next meeting the Lake Forest plan of financing all war activities through one central finance committee. In that city subscriptions for specific activities are not solicited. The Finance Committee solicits general subscriptions and out of the funds so obtained, it finances all the war activities of the city.
 Miss Margaretta Brown reported that over 400 food conservation cards had been mailed to the women of the city and that more would go out within a few days. Highwood will be included. The women are asked to join in the service of food conservation and to accept membership in the United States Food Administration, pledging themselves to carry out the directions and advice of the food administrator in the conduct of their households, in so far as their circumstances may permit. The proposal to collect surplus food supplies and to deliver them to stations in Chicago for distribution among the city's poor was referred to the Committee on Food Production and Conservation.
 Fred D. Porter, Secretary of the Council, reported at a recent meeting of the representatives of the North Shore towns, that the taking of the census was ordered deferred until the State Council of Defense can submit a uniform plan of registration. The list of drafted men and their dependants will be obtained as soon as the exemption board has passed upon the various claims for exemption. A revised Roll of Honor of Highland Park citizens who have entered the service of the government has been posted on the bulletin board at the railway station.
 John M. Tuttle, chairman of the Americanization Committee, was directed to report on the United States Public Service Reserve. So many men have offered their services to the government that the Department of Labor has created the Bureau of Public Service Reserve. All civilians who have offered their services, or who are willing to serve the government in various capacities, are requested to apply for membership in the Public Service Reserve. This will make it easy for the government to locate them when it needs help from men of their capacities. The purpose of the Reserve is to enable those who are not called into the army or navy to play their part in realizing the idea of a whole nation organized to war for the safety of the country and the preservation of civilization and the future peace of the world.

LAKE COUNTY AND NEARBY NEWS NOTES

FISH AT \$36.22 PER POUND

North Chicago Day Monday, September, 3rd, Sears Estate Adds to County Revenue

Fish at \$36.22 Per Pound

Fish at \$36.22 a pound might not be according to the Hoover schedule, but that was the price paid Sunday by George Rosi, 34, and Martin Castagnano 46 for three pounds of small "bull heads" caught in the Des plaines river near Libertyville. Besides they caught the fish themselves. The two men were brought to Waukegan at 10:30 o'clock Saturday night, by Deputy Warden Henry Kern, and in police court Sunday morning they entered pleas of guilty to the charge of illegal fishing and dropped \$108.80 into the coffers of the state of Illinois.

Complaints of illegal fishing were made to the deputy game warden some time ago, and that official has been on the lookout for offenders. He happened along the river Saturday night and at a point near the electric railway bridge saw the two men wading in the water. An investigation followed and resulted in the discovery of a trammel net which the two men claimed as theirs. Mr. Kern assisted them in hauling in their catch and then placed both under arrest. The net was confiscated when they paid their fines in police court.

Add to County Reserve

It was learned Monday that Mrs. Anna L. Sears of Warren township, widow of the late Richard W. Sears, has decided to give Lake county the benefit of taxation of her entire holdings, both realty and personal. She has listed property valued at \$6,000,000 with the assessor of Warren township and the county board of review in session at Waukegan will fix the amount of the assessment which will run close to \$20,000.

The action of Mrs. Sears caused some surprise inasmuch as she had listed property in Lake county to the extent of \$4,500,000 last year and the action had resulted in a suit filed against her by the Cook county board of supervisors who sought to prove that she was a resident of that county and pay taxes there.

The amount which the Cook county board sought to recover last year was \$17,000. This amount was paid into the coffers of Lake County.

Soldiers and Sailors Reunion

About 400 invitations have been sent out over the county for the Lake County Soldiers' and Sailors' association's 39th annual reunion which will be held Wednesday and Thursday, August 15 and 16, under the auspices of the Sons of Veterans camp of Waukegan.

The reunion will be held at Foss park, which is ideally located on a high bluff overlooking Lake Michigan. This beautiful park was selected because it is only two city blocks from Camp Paul Jones, one-half mile from the Great Lakes training station and a twenty minutes' ride to the Reserve Officers' training camp at Fort Sheridan.

North Chicago Day

The second annual North Chicago Day, under the auspices of the Progress Club, will be held at Foss Park, Labor Day, Monday, Sept. 3rd. Last year it rained spoiling one of the biggest feature parades ever planned in history, also making postponement of many of the attractions at the park necessary, yet financially it was successful. Weather forecasters predict fine weather for September 3rd this year. The Progress club owes seven hundred dollars on its club house which can be paid if the North Chicago Day is a success.
