The Commissioned Men Will Train the National Army, Second Camp August 27th

The first Reserve Officers Training camp of Fort Sheridan which went into camp on May the fifteenth closed on Tuesday of this week. A large number of the men who were in training received commissions and these men with their knowledge of military discipline will be put to the task of training the national army which will go into training September first.

During the past week the men have not been required to study evenings and this time has been used largely for pleasures. Large banquets have been given at the Mornaine hotel by various regiments in honor of their captains, whose untiring efforts have helped them to receive their commissions. At other times sham battles have been staged between the Michigan, Wisconsin and Illinois troops.

Some of the men will return to the second camp which will open on Monday, August twenty-seventh. There will be six states represented at the second camp instead of three as in the first, and they are Illinois, Michigan, Wisconsin, Kansas, Missouri and Colorado. There are to be four thousand men in this camp which is the same number as were in the first.
