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HANGING UNMOUNTED FLAGS.

Correct Position of the Union to the Eye of the Observer.

It is sometimes a bit puzzling to know just how to hang a flag—just what is the correct position of the union. A letter to the New York Tribune tells exactly how it should be hung:

"All rules for hanging against a wall a flag which is not attached to its staff are in reference to the right or left hand of the observer. The union will be in the upper right hand corner if the stripes are perpendicular. Thus on a street running north and south the flags on the east side will have their unions toward the north and those on the west side will all have their unions toward the south unless some of them are hung with stripes horizontal, when the position of the union will be reversed. As one drives down the street this may give at first the impression that there is no uniformity, though all the flags may be correctly hung, but every flag will be right side out despite the diversity."

The writer adds that a street banner should be hung across the street at an equal distance from both curbs; that a flag not attached to a staff hung upon a wall should have the union at the top; that the union should be at the left of the observer if the stripes are horizontal; that the union should be at the right of the observer if the stripes are perpendicular.

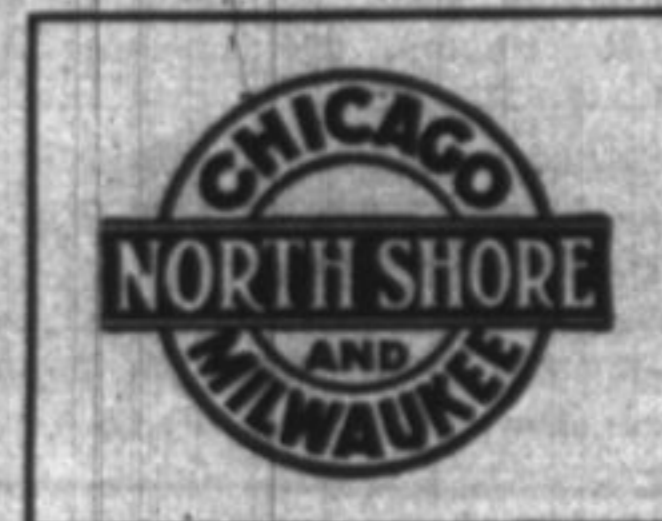

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HOME MIXED FEEDS.

(National Crop Improvement Service.)
When a man undertakes to mix his own rations, what does he do? He buys straight feeds. Take cottonseed meal as a common example. There are a great many different grades of cottonseed meal, and the man who is looking for a low-priced feed is sure to get a low grade. The demand for cheap feeding ingredients has caused the quality to be gradually whittled down. Consequently the farmer nearly always works with feeds which are poorer than he believes them to be. He does not get adequate state protection because inspectors do not go to a farmer's barn to draw samples, and even if they did, it would be hard to get a complete chain of evidence.

A farmer has no facilities for having his feed analyzed and he doesn't know what he is working with. The analyses of mixed feeds costs about ten cents per ton, and if every farmer will read the various bulletins from the agricultural colleges he will soon know those brands which can be depended upon. There is no doubt that at the present prices of grain any farmer can save money by selling his cereal crops and buying mixed feed. Cornmeal, oil meal and cottonseed meal are all high, but the by-products of barley and rye are all more reasonable in price.

Corn has become costly largely due to the demand for pork and beef. Americans will have those meats at almost any price. This puts corn on a meat basis, and the dairy business will have to fall back on the by-products of grains.

GIVE COWS PLENTY OF WATER.

(National Crop Improvement Service.)
When cows are in full milk they require plenty of water. It is stated authoritatively that cows in full flow of milk will consume 50 per cent more water than when dry.

Poor feed sells to poor feeders.

Only that part of the feed that digests is of use—the rest is mostly fertilizer material.

No protein—no casein; no casein—no milk; not enough protein—not so much milk; also not enough feed—not so much food.

Foods with the highest protein and highest analysis are usually but not always the cheapest to use.

WORK BEING RUSHED ON N. S. CEMETERY

HAVE PERFECT DRAINAGE

First Three Thousand Feet of Trenches for Sewer System are Dug and Ready for the Sewer Pipes

The building of what will probably be North Shore's famous necropolis north of Lake Forest is progressing satisfactorily even though the Company has had the United States Government for a competitor in the labor market in the extension of the naval training station and the building of barracks for thousands of men only two or three miles from the cemetery ground.

The first three thousand feet of trenches for the sewer system are dug seven feet deep for the sewer pipes, four carloads of which are on the way to the nearest shipping point. Two carloads of four and six inch drain tile were received last week. The excavation of the balance of the trenches for the sewers is being pushed and the pipe will be laid and the catch basins built as soon as the various sizes of sewer pipe are received.

The management announces that Section B, from which lots are now being sold, will be the best drained cemetery section in the state of Illinois. Although this section is only three hundred feet wide and has a large sewer seven feet deep on every side three tile drains six and seven feet deep are being placed under the foot paths in the section. This will remove all doubt whatever as to the absolute drainage of this section.

The fall from the lowest spot in the grounds to a place in the natural water course one-half mile away is fifty feet and the lowest spot in the ground is twenty-five feet lower than a large percentage of the other portions of the cemetery. Hence, it is plain that there never will be any question about water standing in the ground anywhere in North Shore Cemetery. It is customary to place sewers only three or four feet deep in most cemeteries because of lack of

fall or drainage courses and in order to save money in development work. However, the officers of North Shore Cemetery assert that they never will be satisfied with that kind of work and so they are putting in sewers seven feet below the surface.

The lowest spot in the grounds is being utilized to make a picturesque little lake, and the excavation for this lake is now completed.

As may be inferred from what has already been said, great care was used by the founders in selecting ground admirably adapted for the making of a first class necropolis worthy of the great North Shore district and being on a high ridge, perfect drainage for all time to come is assured. As the topography is beautifully undulating—containing large expanses of pleasing slopes and many crowning places—there is no doubt that charming landscape pictures will greet the eye at every turn after the company has had the assistance of nature in growing trees, shrubs and grass under the skillful management of the best landscape talent for a few years.

Thorough-going methods of the management in all development work will be further illustrated in the making of the permanent drives, as it is announced that eight inches of crushed stone will be used, to be laid under the most modern and approved methods with the use of two coats of tarvis. This kind of a road is about as good as can be built even for the heavy traffic of a public highway. As cemetery drives do not have one twentieth the wear of the much travelled public thoroughfare it is asserted that drives built under the specifications mentioned will last hundreds of years.
