## TIMELY SERMON ON "IS WAR EVER JUSTIFIABLE?"

night-storm, and behold Anglo-Saxon England secure for the larger civilization of the world. Stand under on the field of Waterloo when the destinies of mankind trembled in the balances, and behold Napoleon defeated, in Victor Hugo's thought, not because Blucher came to the side of Wellington at a strategic moment but because a tyrant had embarrassed God." Stand under on the sacrificial sod of Gettysburg, and behold victory resting on the arms of Meade and the North, not because the charge of brave Pickett had failed but because the God of Patriot Heart and George Washington had decreed that the republic for which Abraham Lincoln prayed that day should forever remain one and united and free. Recently I received a photograph of an old southern church with these words printed beneath it "Woodrow Wilson's father was minister here from 1858 until 1871. And, as I read, I knew that I had looked into the boy in the impressionable years of his life were the great principles of truth and righteousness which half a century later leaped from the altar of his heart as he bared his brow beneath the heavens of divine approval and said, unsheathing his sword in the name of outraged humanity, "I cannot do otherwise. God is my witness." It is more like the prayer of a priest that the stern ultimatum of a president, "The Lord at thy right hand shall strike through Kings" is a sentence from the Book, and the ample page of history has answered in the affirmative my question, "Is War ever justifiable?"

My country, Oh my country, clearly sighted and strong. A shield for the defenseless, a flame against the wrong.

**Pacifist vs. Militarist**

The exponents of two divergent views regarding war, each of them extremists, are before us at this hour. One is the Pacifist, the other the Militarist.

Honest and earnest I grant the Pacifist may be in many instances and yet, he is in danger of confusing the meaning of two things—being visionary and having a vision. He is disposed to overlook and misinterpret stubborn facts and solemn responsibilities in order to hold aloft a beautiful ideal—the "sheathed sword," the "Parliament of nations," the "Brotherhood of man"—seemingly forgetting that these are the ideals of other people as well as of himself. He denies the right of any nation to ask or force its subjects to take up arms. He professes to put what he calls "humanity-sentiment" before "nation-sentiment." He would stop singing "My country, 'tis of Thee" if the singing of it should nurture a spirit of national pride irritating to others. He contends that under no circumstances could Christ take up arms or wear the uniform of a soldier. He declares that it is inconsistent to pray Christ's prayer for forgiveness and proceed to overcome an enemy. He quotes from a fragment of the gospel, "Resist not the evil."

**Passivism Impracticable**

And the pacifist, be he impracticable and visionary, has a noble cause at heart, even though at this stage of the world's dismantled civilization, he presents an impossible program—a dislodge dream. Henry Ford was a pacifist in spirit to the extent of half a million dollars until he got as far as Stockholm. "Almost within sight of the cruel arbitrament of fire and sword, he saw to the heart of the imperial savagery that had welded it in order to make Prussianism supreme in the world. Within six months he refused to give audience to a leader of pacifists and offered his great automobile factory to the government for war work. Almost every college president in America preached the pacifist doctrine to his students until in 1917 they heard a speech from bruised Belgium, resisting a godless intrusion of force. Then "get to the campus and drill" was the universal word, as tens of thousands of America's best blood and brain flocked in a day to the colors to live their motto and, if need be, die for it—My country first, my coat of mail an undivided heart.

**The Philosophy of Militarism**

Militarism, in these days when its matted fist is in the face of the world, needs no definition. The representative of it is he, ruler or subject, who, bowing not to the altar of the Christian's Jehovah but at the pagan altar of Mars, drinks to the skeleton of death and proclaims, as he drinks, in Blumarek's words "By blood and iron we shall extend our power; nothing shall prevent us."

Three thousand years ago I find Assyria plotting for a war of aggression and saying: "Are not my princes in Assyria altogether kings? Shall I not as I have done unto Samaria do even so unto Jerusalem." Drunk with her lust for power, as Kipling sings of militarism; boasting her preparedness, as Bernardi did in his book five years ago of Germany's readiness to strike, Assyria staggered to her feet and justified her mad thirst for power—more power.

And the practice of such warfare for the Assyrian type of nation has a philosophy behind it—the philosophy of low-browed junkerism which for fifty years has proscribed Germany's soul at the altars of physical might and impregnated the soul of a once noble nation with the seeds of arrogance and strife.

Take this sentence from Bernardi sent out to the world, notwithstanding the protest of thousands of German professors and preachers, but with the consent of the cabinet and the court "To sum up our arguments we shall see from the most opposite aspects that all efforts directed toward the abolition of war must be termed not only foolish but absolutely immortal." Add to this a sentence from an article by Treitschke, the German historian, "The scepter of the nations will belong to the Germans who will impose their will upon the decadent and impotent peoples round about them." Add to these this sentence from Goethe, "Let this sentence from Goethe, "Let
