plete description of the courses offered in the School this year will be printed next week.

Through the kindness of Colonel James A. Ryan, commandant at Ft. Sheridan, a bus is to be run every Sunday from the Fort to Highland Park to take children there to Sunday School in Highland Park as it does on week days to day school. It is hoped that some such an arrangement can be made so that the little children at least who live in Ravinia can be brought up to Sunday School. Plans are on foot for the accomplishment of that.

Parents are urged to get a copy of the Teachers' Manual of the courses their children are taking. These may be obtained of the Superintendent and cost 60c for the full year. Monthly letters, are sent the parents, telling them what they may do to help the pupil each week in the preparation of his or her lesson.

Three things are essential to the success of the school: (1) Punctuality, (2) Regularity, (3) Conscientious preparation of the lessons at home. The co-operation of parents is sought to make the school succeed in its purpose, which is: The development, instruction and by example (and the greater of these is example) of a Christian Character in each pupil committed to the care of the school—in short, "Christian Nurture."

LAKE COUNTY AND NEARBY NEWS NOTES

BAD WRECK ON E. J. & E.
Waukegan's Aged City Clerk Passes Away. New High School Dedicated at Libertyville.

Wreck on E. J. & E. R. R.
One of the worst head-on collisions ever seen in Lake County took place last Thursday afternoon about four o'clock when two "double-header" freight trains on the Elgin, Joliet and Eastern railroad came together at a point between Twenty-second and Broadway, in North Chicago. Members of the train crew escaped injury by jumping for their lives shortly before the crash took place.

Three of the four engines were practically reduced to junk. Four freight cars, smashed into kindling wood, were hurled into the ditch. There is but a single track at this point where the accident took place. Two engines forming a double-header and drawing two freight cars and a baggage car, were going south at the time. Another double-header was drawing a freight train of thirty or forty cars from the south.

The engineers and firemen saw the impending collision too late to prevent it, but they did all in their power to reduce the force of the crash and then leaped to safety, rolling down the bank and thus escaping with a few minor bruises.

The crash was heard for blocks and hundreds of people hastened to the scene, expecting to find a serious loss of life. A mistake in signals or instructions is thought to have been the cause of the wreck.

Aged Town Clerk Dies
George W. Hutchinson, aged 79, town clerk of Waukegan continuously for 44 years passed away Saturday morning at 3:40 at the Lake county hospital where he had been living since last December. In a way the death of the faithful old town officer was sudden, for up to a few days ago he had been in his usual health. Thursday he suffered one of his periodical attacks of stomach trouble and his condition became critical. Friday afternoon it was seen that the end was not far away.

Mr. Hutchinson had held the office of town clerk for 44 years. In addition to this position he served as clerk in the office of the circuit clerk and county recorder. He had held that position 46 years. Mr. Hutchinson held the record of being the oldest town clerk in Illinois, both with regard to age and term of service.

Dedicate New High School
Libertyville's fine \$65,000 high school building was dedicated Friday afternoon and evening, a large number of people being present on both occasions. Hon. Rodney B. Swift, of Libertyville, state senator of Illinois, gave the dedicatory address in the evening. A number of prominent residents of Libertyville also gave short talks. County Superintendent of Schools T. A. Simpson gave a talk in the afternoon in which he congratulated the people of Libertyville upon having one of the finest high school buildings in the state of Illinois.

It would be difficult to imagine a more modern and up-to-date building. The ventilation and sanitary conditions are perfect and the equipment is of the best. All the rooms are located on one floor.

Frost Causes Damage
A heavy frost and even freezing in some parts of the county caused thousands of dollars worth of damage during Monday night. The more hardy vegetables and flowers were not injured but the less hardy varieties were badly damaged, tomatoes suffering the worst.

The temperature fell to 40 degrees during the night and some declare that it was lower than that in other parts of the county.

Many residents of the county report the killing of corn and tomatoes but in other sections they apparently were not affected.
