CAN ALL YOU CAN

Housewives of the United States, attention! Your Government is calling on you to mobilize and enlist as unofficial members of the commissary departments for the army, the navy, and the country at large. Our soldiers and sailors must not fight famine and the enemy at the same time; our officers must not be unduly harassed by the problem of feeding their troops; our industrial army must not fall off in efficiency for lack of proper food; our children must not become stunted weaklings because of malnutrition; and there are millions of mouths to be filled in stricken Europe. More food is needed than the canning companies can possibly supply even though they kept their plants going twenty-four hours a day. It's up to you to rally round the flag in the production, as well as the conservation of food.

Why

From the first moment of recorded time war has killed its thousands, while famine and pestilence, the colleagues of war, have killed their tens of thousands. You can fight these most effectively without leaving your homes or your children. Make ready, fire—your cookstoves. Canning is as essential to America's success as cannonading; pickling is as patriotic as picketing. Napoleon, recognizing that "an army marches on its belly," paid a prize of 12,000 francs to the man who evolved that system of preserving food by sterilization and hermetic sealing which has proved the forerunner of our modern canning industry. It follows that those who help keep those stomachs healthily filled are contributing in no small measure and ultimate peace with honor.

It is fortunate indeed that commercial canning on a giant scale has not caused home canning to become one of the lost arts for the Secretary of Agriculture says that there is vital need that every housewife should conserve the available food supply by every method of preservation that human ingenuity has been able to evolve throughout all the ages.

The present food and labor situation is such that no home should expect others to supply those foods which can be produced effectively by its members. The railroads will be taxed to their capacity with the transportation of staple foods and civil and military necessities from the places of production and manufacture to those communities which are incapable of supplying their own needs. It follows, therefore, that the conservation of food by home methods will lessen the winter pressure on transportation agencies and also release the products of the factories for other purposes.

How

The needs of the housewives of the United States have not been forgotten in the rush of equipping the military branches. The Department of Agriculture has prepared a number of bulletins about the preservation of foods which give instructions so fully and so clearly that anyone, adult or child, without previous experience and with no other equipment than that to be found in almost every home, should be able to can food satisfactorily.

The department has recognized and studied every factor in the situation; has met the possibility of a shortage of sugar in instructions on how to preserve without its use and the threatened shortage of cans both by a bulletin on preserving fruits and vegetables by the drying process (which was probably the very first method of preserving food adopted by the human race), and by a bulletin on the fermentation method (which is widely used abroad but is comparatively unknown in this country except in putting up sauerkraut and pickles). Farmers' Bulletin No. 839: Home Canning by the One-Pot Cold-Pack Method. (This bulletin covers the canning of vegetables by very simple methods; also the canning of fruit without sugar.)

Farmers' Bulletin No. 841: Drying Fruits and Vegetables in the Home. (This bulletin tells how to construct drying equipment, how to dry the fruits and vegetables, how to store the products, and how to cook them.)

HIGHLAND PARK CLUB

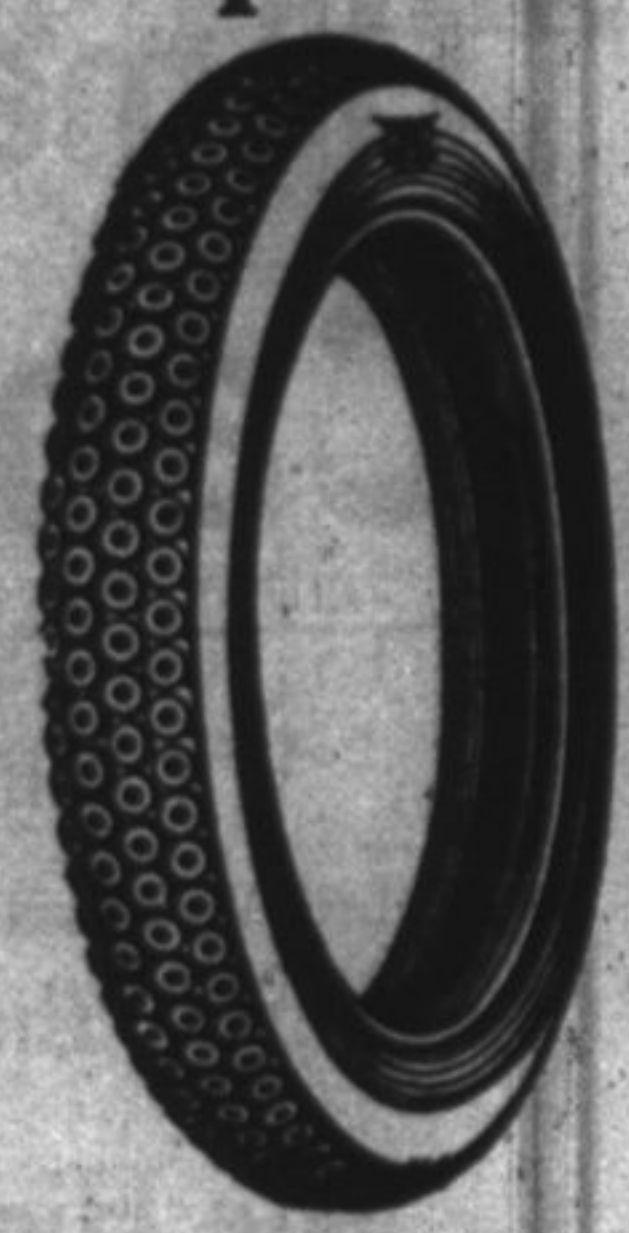
The opening dance will take place Friday evening October twelfth. Programs will be issued shortly. Interior decoration is being completed this week.

Men who are opposed to the United States fighting the war in Europe are in favor of fighting it in this country.

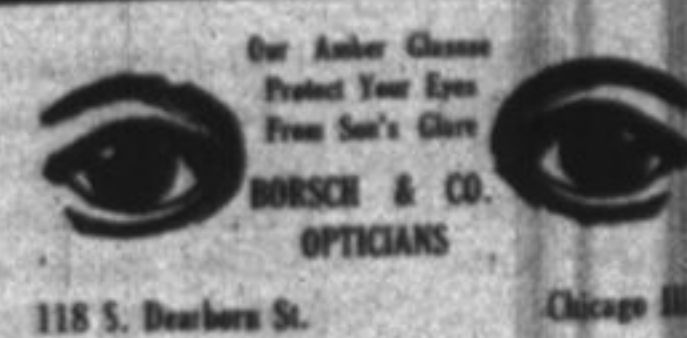
A war bride is a nice thing to have in the family strong box, but hardly safe to trot out for exemption purposes.
