the high school cadets. Miss Margareta Brown representing the Red Cross, and two companies of the Blue Cross girls from the high school, boy scouts, the exemption board of Lake county, Mr. Willis of Highland Park, chairman and Mr. Miller of Libertyville, veterans and prominent citizens, then came 156 drafted men. They formed in mass before the station where Mr. Miller read a telegram of good wishes from Mayor Hastings who was unavoidably absent from the city. He then introduced Dr. McClure of Lake Forest, from the McCormick Theological Seminary, who gave a short inspiring address. Dr. Wolcott led in prayer, after which every one joined in singing the Star Spangled Banner.

The train pulled in and amid many cheers and farewells our men were off on their first step to the war.

The last thing they saw of home was the Red Cross flag waving in the breeze.
